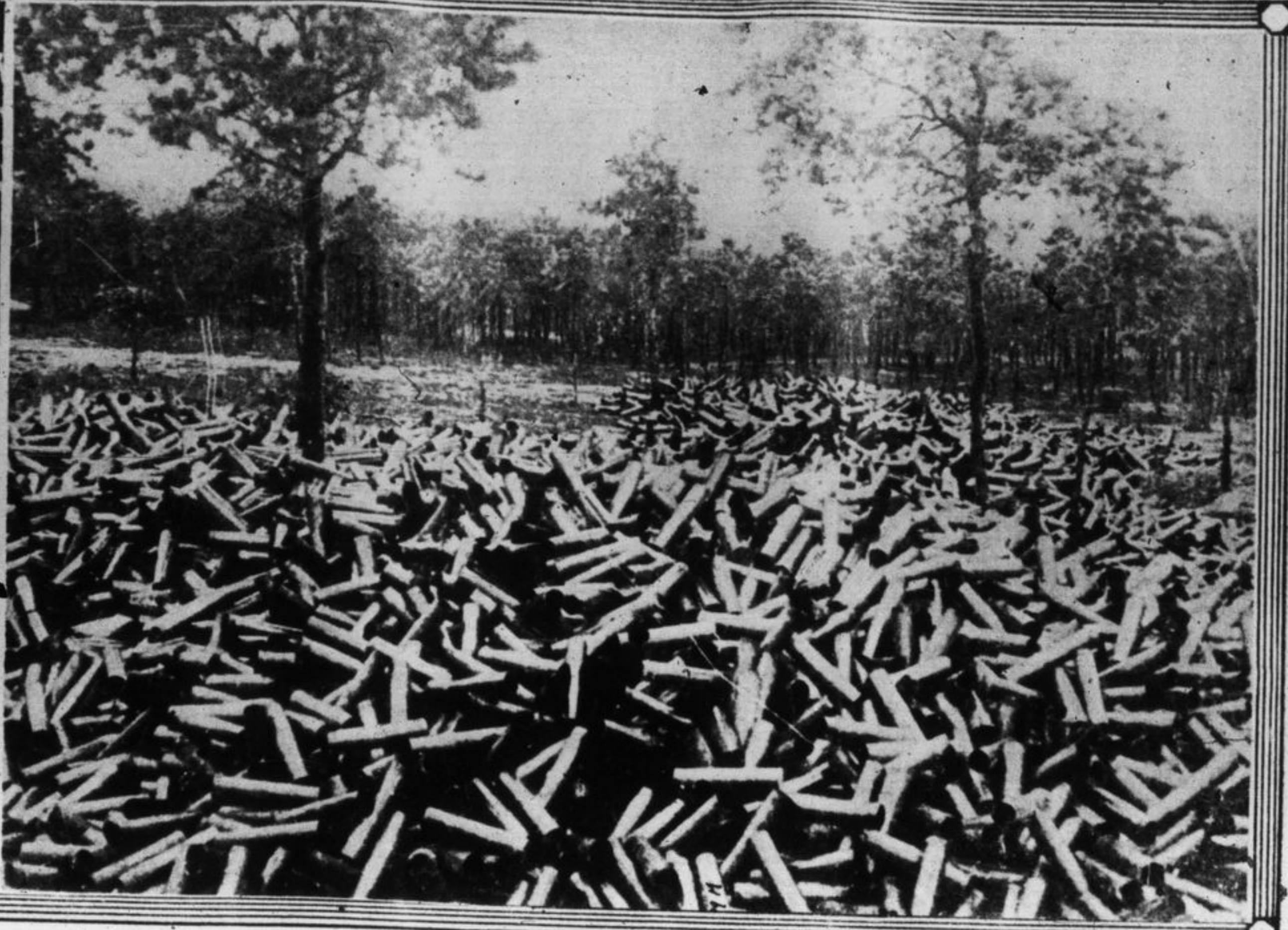
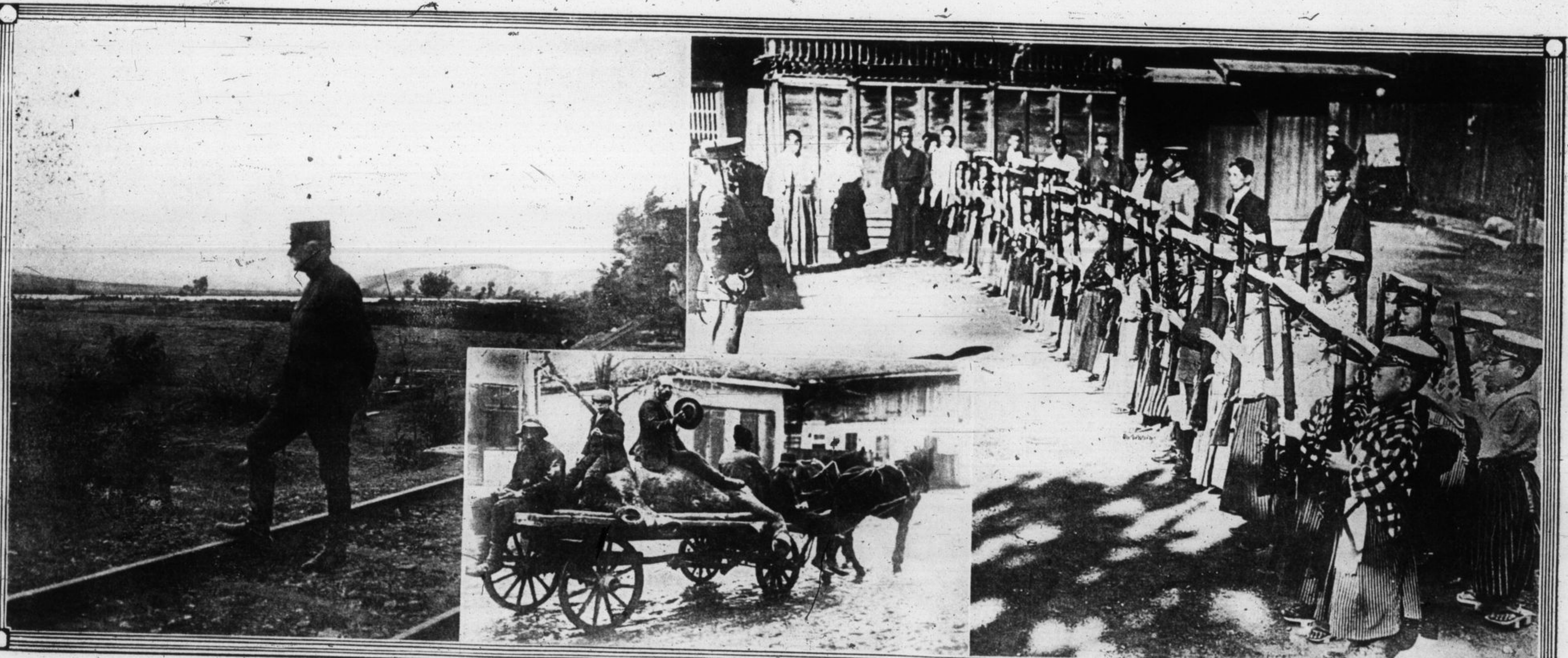

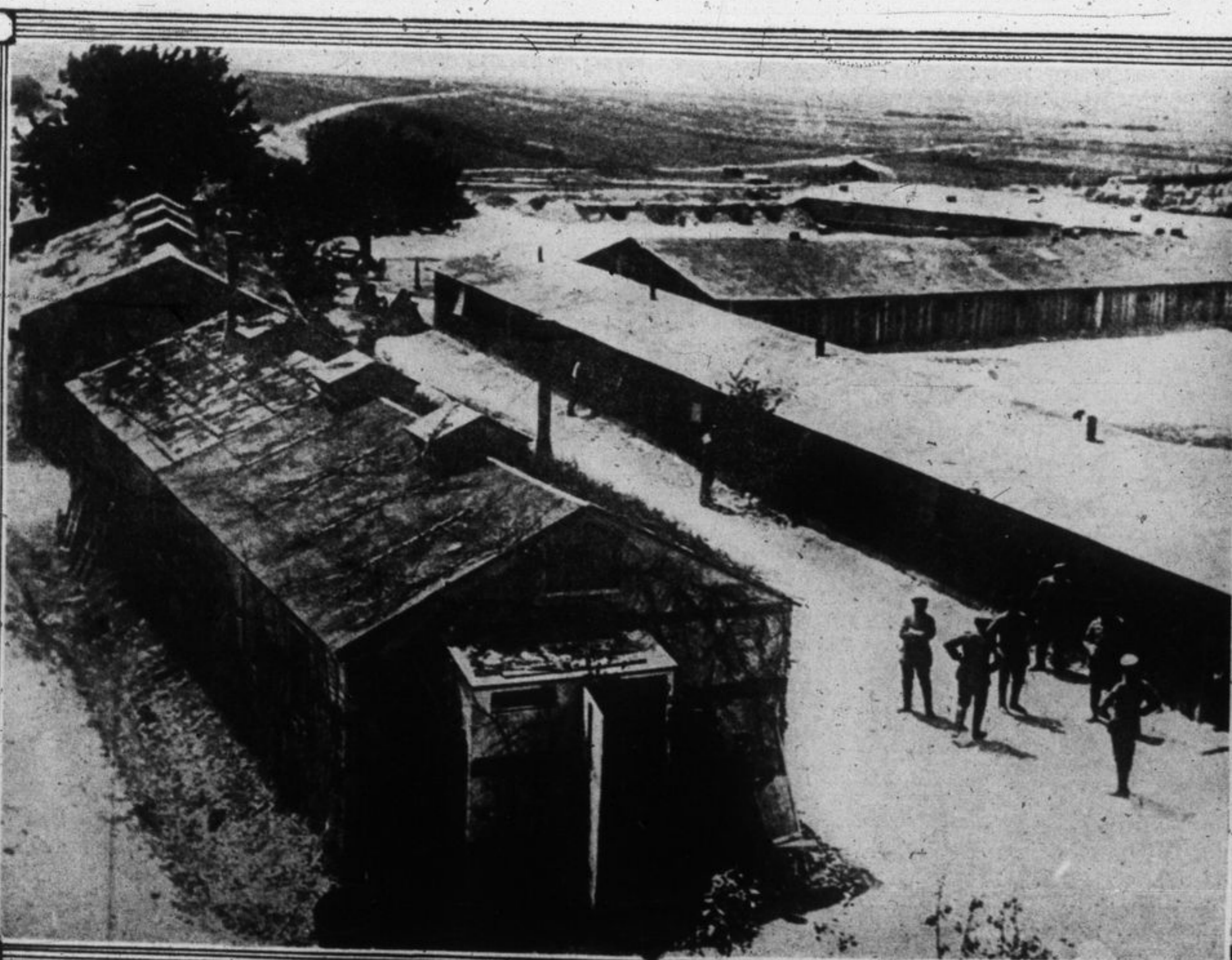
Official photograph by the photographic section of the French Army. Some of the empty shells that were fired by battery of the famous French 75.



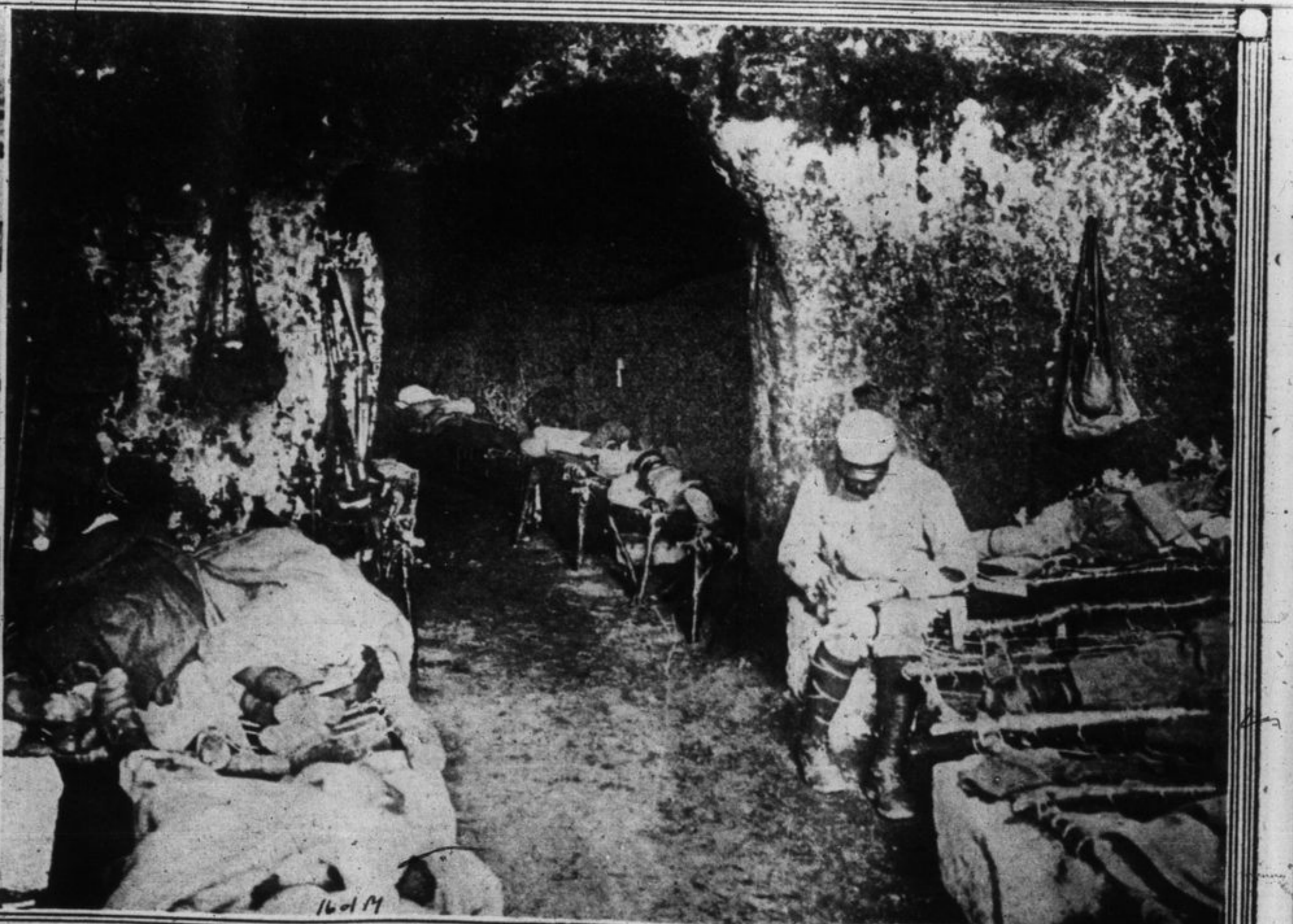
