The latter result is certainly being achieved, and a prodigious supply of eggs is daily being dispatched to the breeding depots at Collingwood, Belleville, Wiarton, Point Edward, etc. Even Sir Sam's personally conducted department is not busier these weeks than the hustling branch of the Fisheries with their more than fifty hatcheries to populate.

While the Dominion concerns itself about commercial fish - salmon, whitefish, halibut, etc., lobsters, and oysters - Ontario as a Province anxious to cater to tourists, is encouraged to conserve similarly her natural supply of sporting fish wall, eye cut by puck. The procedure is decidedly interesting." Last week the first shipment of speckled trout eggs, numbering 150,000, arrived from Haliburton at Mt. Pleasant hatchery, near Brantford, which is furnished with extensive brooding ponds. To secure these the fish were netted, and the eggs and milk deftly pressed by skilful hands into tubs, where they are stirred together and the eggs fertilized. In the hatchery follow several washings and then they are transferred to glass jars. The quantity of eggs per fish varies according to species; whitefish and pickerel yielding about 35,000. One of the jars will hold 150,000 whitefish or 250, 000 pickerel eggs, and in the batcheries stand close together rows them, generally in three tiers, so as to be readily in view of the overseer every minute of the day. Through each jar passes constantly a stream of pure water fed at the bottom, the overflow discharging at the mouth of the vessel; this prevents the coagulation of the egg mass and its consequent destruction. The whitefish ova being collected now will batch in these jars in about five months, being ready for distribution next May. Pickerel break their tender shells in six weeks, but are gathered as a rule in May. Upon hatching, these fry are placed in large vessels to find their "legs," and in a week are ready for shipment in cans to the point where a Government boat is ready to convey and dump them in the best-suited lo-
