

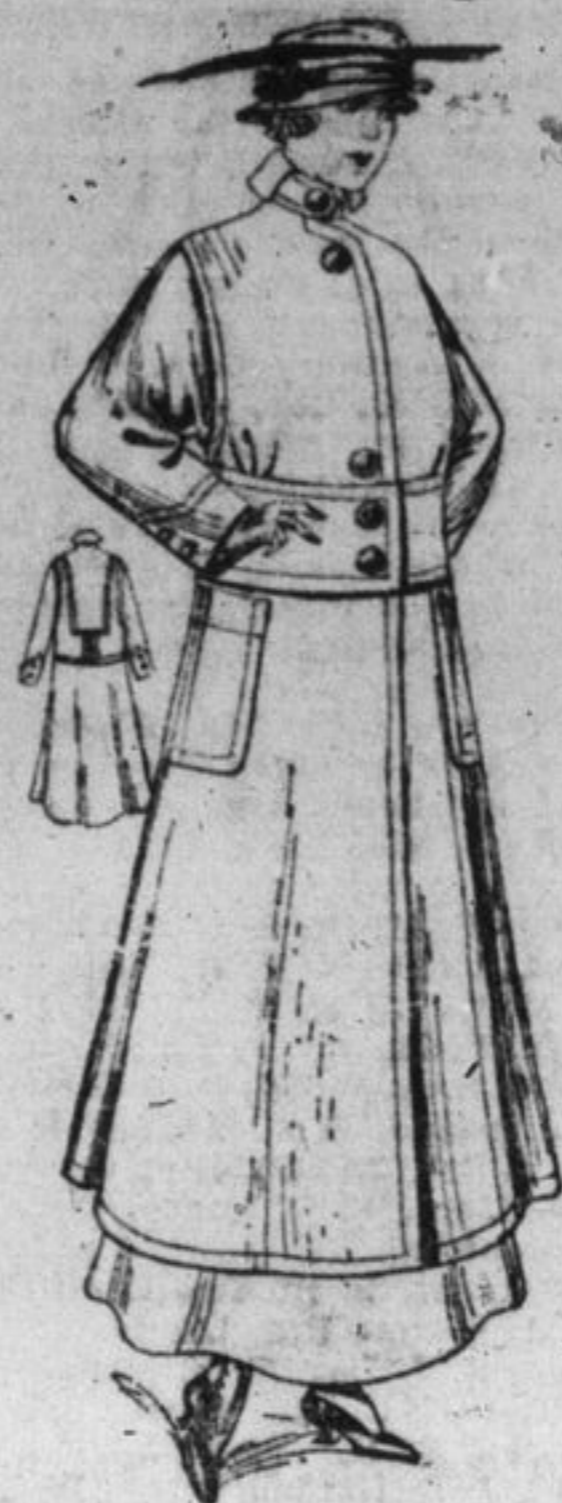

Gananoque

(From Our Own Correspondent.)
Jan. 14.—The annual meeting of the Gananoque Board of Trade was held at the International Hotel last evening. From 7 to 8 an excellent supper was served and some 60 members sat down. After supper the annual business meeting was held. The president, A. W. Taylor, gave an excellent resume of the business of 1915. The election of officers resulted:

President, A. W. Taylor; first vice-president, C. Sine; second vice-president, M. McFarland; secretary, C. A. Watt; hon. presidents, Sir Thomas White, Senator Col. Taylor, Charles MacDonald, C.E., F. J. Skinner and Dr. E. L. Atkinson; auditors, Messrs. Gould and Cooper.

It was decided that no contributions be allowed at the Board of Trade sessions during the current year. The secretary's report showed a balance of \$26.25 to the credit of the Board. The fee was reduced from \$5 to \$2.50 for 1916. The secretary offered a voluntary reduction of 25 per cent. in his salary. At the family residence at Lindsay's Point, Mrs. Alexander Lindsay, a highly respected resident of this section, passed away yesterday, aged seventy-six years. She had only been ailing for a short time. The funeral will be held on Saturday afternoon.

James Soles, an employee of W. G. Rogers, had the misfortune to lose two of his fingers while working in the butcher shop on Wednesday.

It has been reported here that "A" Company, 59th Battalion, will be moved to Brockville the fore part of next week, and both citizens and soldiers have heard it with regret.

Mrs. W. S. Abbott, South street, entertained a few friends at her home last evening.

Quite a large number of young people of the town drove to the home of Miss Norma Toner, Pittsburg township, on Wednesday evening, and were royally entertained.

E. H. Hurd, Brock street, who has been confined to his home by illness for the past three weeks, left for Kingston at noon yesterday.

Died Near Gananoque.

Gananoque, Jan. 14.—Mrs. Margaret Brown, relict of the late James Brown, died Wednesday morning at her home on the Kingston road, about three miles west of Gananoque. The deceased lady was well known and highly respected in the neighborhood and surrounding country, having lived the greater part of her life in the same vicinity. She was a daughter of the late John Harpell an E. Loyalist, and was born at Harpell's Corners ninety-two years ago. She leaves to mourn her loss two sons and one daughter: John on the homestead; Robert in Syracuse, and Mrs. Harrison Cowan, Gananoque. One brother also survives, Henry Harpell, Cataragui, and a great many relatives.

DIED AT GANANOQUE.

The Late Mrs. Thomas Whitmore, in Her Eightieth Year.

Gananoque, Jan. 14.—The late Mrs. Thomas Whitmore, who died on the 8th, was formerly Margaret Rea, daughter of William Rea, and was born near Toledo, April 12th, 1836. She married Thomas Whitmore in 1858, who died in October, 1887. Twelve years ago she removed to Gananoque, making her home with her daughter, Mrs. Thomas Hill. During the past five years she had been in poor health, and some weeks ago she was taken with a severe attack of grippe and bronchitis. She passed away on Saturday last.

Seven of her nine children survive, being: Mrs. William Iva Hunter, Calgary; Mrs. Edward Freeman, Chantary; George, Jackson, Michigan; William, Regina; James, on the home farm, Toledo; Mrs. James Hill, Barrie street, Kingston, and Mrs. Thomas Hill, Gananoque. Four of these were present at her funeral held Monday, January 10th. Her pastor, Rev. Melvin Taylor, officiated.

Mrs. Whitmore was converted in services held by the Rev. Mr. McFitzgerald at Frankville about forty years ago. She then united with the Methodist Church, of which she remained an earnest and consistent member. As long as strength was given, she found her way to the house of God. Her life was exemplary, her character fashioned after that of the Divine Master, and her children used to call her blessed.
