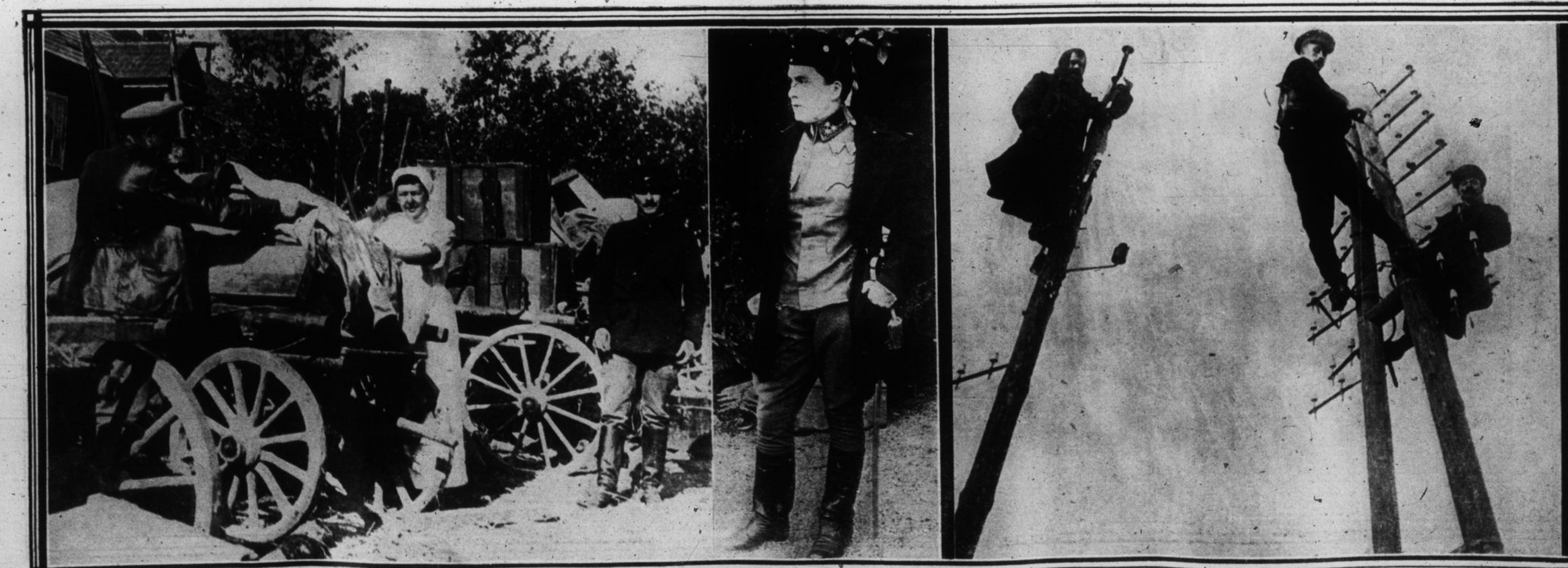
Sketch of the figures that Gutzon Borghum, the sculptor, will carve on the face of Stone Mountain, Ga., to illustrate the History of the Confederacy.

THE NEW RUSSIAN MENACE: INVASION OF BULGARIA BY VETERAN RUSSIAN INFANTRY. Reports and rumors have been afloat that Russia was preparing for an invasion of Bulgaria, and that her troops would be given free passage through Rumania. Rumania has stuck to its strict neutrality, and the only other way for the Czar to make his thrust at Bulgaria was by the Black Sea. Cabled reports, Dec. 21st, told of the bombardment of the Bulgarian port of Varna, on the Black Sea, by the Russian fleet. This picture, which has just reached this country, was taken at the mouth of the Danube on the Russian-Rumanian frontier. The men are all veterans of the Polish campaigns, and, to say the least, they are hardy, rugged fighters. They are part of the huge Russian army which has been mobilized at this region for the invasion of Bulgaria.

KITCHENER WITHDRAWS TROOPS FROM DARDANELLES AFTER INSPECTION. Shortly after Lord Kitchener's return from his tour on the Gallipoli Peninsula, the British forces began retiring from the territory. It is believed that this was due in great measure to the report which Lord Kitchener brought back with him. A Russian Flying Ambulance in readiness behind the lines. The carts are always ready to move away, the horses being stationed near. A supply of bandages and chemicals is in the cart in case a hurried departure is necessary. The picture was taken so close to the actual battlefield that the firing of rifles and machine-guns is distinctly heard.

None of the countries of Europe now at war are without their brave women, who are doing duty with the armies as nurses or special officers. The Countess Jarema Kus, who is described as a volunteer officer in the Austrian army, has been decorated twice for services in the Servian campaign.

One of the most important things in the present war is keeping the communications, both telegraph and telephone, open at all times.
