In the Department of Physics, Prof. Clark has been awarded \$300 for research work from the Rumford Fund by the American Academy of Arts and Sciences for this year.

The second year work in the Banking course is continued to field encouraging results. The conditions have not been favorable for a widespread extension of the enrollment. The members of the staffs of the various chartered banks have been among the foremost in Canada in enlisting the portion in some banks exceeding twenty-five per cent, while at the same time the revival of business activities in the summer has thrown increased burdens upon the rest of the staffs. In spite of these circumstances, 165 new men registered this fall and another of the leading banks, the Merchants Bank of Canada, has given official sanction and endorsement to the plan. In addition about 300 of the men who began last year are still registered.

PTE. T. M. FLANAGAN THEIR HOME BURNED

A KINGSTON MEMBER OF 21ST BATTALION DEAD. AND AN AGED COUPLE ARE SUFFERING FROM BURNS.

Telegram To His Mother Says He Died of a Wound in the Leg Which He Received on January 2nd.

Private Thomas Michael Flanagan, 21st Battalion, one of Kingston's best known sporting followers, died as a result of wounds that he received at the front, according to a telegram received by his mother from the Adjutant-General on Sunday. Pte. Flanagan was born and raised in the city, and had a wide circle of friends who knew and respected him. Six years ago he was manager of the Wellington hockey team composed of Hrouse, Reid, Goodearle, LaRush, Grattan, and others who are still in the sport.

When the call to enlist came to him he was in London, Ont., and joined the uniform of the 18th Battalion. In England he transferred to the 21st Battalion, so that he could be with his old Kingston friends. He "chummed" with "Ching" Allen, who a few days ago was wounded, but is rapidly recovering. A letter received by his mother, which was written by the dead soldier on Christmas Day, spoke of Allen being wounded in the arm.

On January 2nd Pte. Flanagan was wounded in the leg, and Sunday's telegram revealed the fact that he had died in No. 3 Casualty Station as a result.

The deceased was twenty-five years of age, and is survived by his mother, Mrs. Mary Flanagan, 130 Baggot street, two sisters, Agnes and Kathleen, and two brothers, Arthur and John, all at home.

WOMEN'S CANADIAN CLUB. Hears a Paper on the Balkan States' Politics.

A very enthusiastic and well-attended meeting of the Women's Canadian Club was held in the old Arts Building of Queen's University on Saturday afternoon, with Mrs. G. D. Skelton in the chair. Mrs. S. R. Velle gave an interesting talk on "The History and Politics of the Balkan States." She showed the origin of the much-discussed Eastern question and mentioned that it was even a case as to whether Russia or Turkey was to have the control of the buffer states between Asia and Europe. England had already backed Turkey so as to retain her highway to India.

Due to a misunderstanding, Miss Helen Campbell was unable to be present to give an address on "The Customs and Costumes of the Balkan States."

FIRE HORSES RAN AWAY. While Being Exercised Early On Monday Morning.

People passing down Brook street at 7:30 o'clock Monday morning were startled at seeing a team of fire horses belonging to No. 2 station galloping up the middle of the road without a driver. It seems that the driver got off the sleigh at Montreal street to adjust the harness, when suddenly the horses started off at full gallop, leaving him standing in the road. The well-trained team proceeded up as far as Frontenac street where they were stopped.

Want Dangers To Navigation Removed From Rideau.

Ald. James Muir, of the Ottawa City Council has filed a motion asking that a deputation wait on the Dominion Government and ask it to improve the Rideau Canal between Ottawa and Kingston removing dangers to navigation and establishing aids to navigators. Ald. Muir asks that interested municipalities, Boards of Trade, and members of the legislature be united to join the deputation.
