NEWS ABOUT TROOPS QUARTERED IN CITY

As Queen's Battery may leave Kingston next month it will probably be necessary for the men attending lectures at the College to drop their class work so that the final touches in training and organization may be put on without any delay.

S. D. Whaley are attached to the 146th Battalion, making a total of forty-four officers on duty.

Sergt. P. J. Fisher has been appointed C. S. M. to "B" Company.

G. H. Staley has been appointed sergeant while acting in the medical office of the 146th Battalion.

Sergt. George Shortt, Arts '15, who has spent six months in the Paymaster-General's Department at Ottawa, was in the city in connection with the formation of the 8th Artillery Brigade in Kingston, of which the Queen's Battery (46th) is a unit. His many friends about Queen's were glad to welcome him and to hear that he had been recommended for the position of paymaster with the 8th Brigade with rank of captain or major.

These appointments as lieutenants in Queen's Officer's Training corps are announced: "A" Company—C. S. Allia, A. S. Ferguson. "B" Company—L. M. Hanna. "C" Company—J. S. McCormick. "D" Company—K. F. Ettiner, J. M. Munro.

Supplemental examinations for certificate "A" will be held on January 22nd for those of the Queen's officers' Training Corps, who failed in this examination last March.

Sergt. "Bob" Dibble of the Aquatic Battery, Kingston, the American amateur champion oarsman, has secured his transfer from the battery and is at his home in Toronto. He will join the new Sportsmen's Battalion as soon as arrangements are completed for recruiting to commence.

Ernest Broome, Renfrew attending Queen's University, has enlisted as a member of Queen's Stationary Hospital, to go to Cairo.

The two companies of the 59th Battalion stationed in Brockville will send a team to the Indoor Athletic Meet which will be held in Kingston on the 22nd.

Col. Adams was sent to the Bellevue hospital by Major McColl, M.O. The colonel is suffering from grippe.

The Military Cross awarded to Lieut. Edwin Baker, Collin's Bay is designed expressly for the present war and is of silver. It is 1 3/8 inches square. The Imperial Crown is borne on each of the four arms, and His Majesty's cipher appears in the centre on a small raised cross surmounting the larger one. The decoration is a most effective one, different from any other in use, and most creditable to its designer, Mr. H. F. Burke, C.V.O., C.B., F.S.A., Norroy King of Arms.

It is suspended from a ribbon 1 1/2 inches wide, having a central band of dark purple with white on either side, and is intended for captains, commanding officers of a lower grade, or warrant officers in the British army of Indian or Colonel military forces. As in the cases of other decorations, many of these crosses have been awarded for life-saving under the enemy's fire.

William Burton, Harrowsmith, has arrived in the city to take the next course for infantry officers. Mr. Burton is a veteran of the South African war. He expects to be able to help the 146th get some good recruits from his district.

Major A. D. Scott, Montreal, will likely be given the command of one of the new French Canadian battalions. He is a graduate of the Royal Military College.

W. J. Egan, Cobden, is coming to the next P. S. I. school to qualify having been granted a lieutenancy in the 130th Lanark and Renfrew battalion.
