During the evening a very pleasant event took place, when W. R. Buck, who had acted as chief councillor for three successive years, was presented with an address accompanied by a purse of gold.

H. A. Chadwick, auditor, showed that Recorder, R. C. Bell, had handed over \$10,000 during the year, and that after paying all indebtedness the council had a balance of nearly \$1,000. This council had a membership of 575 on Dec. 31st, 1915.

Refreshments were served during the evening by the ladies of the council.

Fifteen members of the council, up to date, have enlisted for overseas, five of whom went with the first contingent. The council paid the cost of the insurance of those going with the first contingent from the beginning of the war to Dec. 31st, 1915.

This was the information given the Whig on Wednesday morning. Old Probs has not been at all favorable to the ice business thus far this winter, but he will have ample time to "make good" now.

"No, we haven't been able to get started yet," said one ice man when asked by the Whig, "but I think we will be able to get after it in another week's time."

The weather has been so mild up till just recently, that some of the dealers commenced to think that they were not able to get any ice. Not one piece of ice has been cut as yet. Some of the dealers who get ice for cooling purposes will likely be the first to get busy.

The heavy fall of snow was a great drawback to ice-making. With the snow coming just as it did after the ice had taken, prevented the making of good thick ice which is much desired. As a general rule, the gathering in of the ice is well under way at this time of the year, although about seven years ago it was the 5th of February before the harvesting began.
