**THE BOARD OF HEALTH**

**WILL TAKE ACTION REGARDING UNSANITARY HOUSES.**

Will Co-operate With Mayor Richardson in His Move to Have a Clean City—B. Blackhall Was Elected New Chairman.

The Board of Health will co-operate with Mayor Richardson in his plan to have all the houses of an unsanitary condition closed up until they are put in proper shape. Mayor Richardson brought the matter up before the members of the Board at their inaugural meeting held on Tuesday afternoon, and the members agreed that there were many houses in Kingston which were unfit for people to live in, and that they should be closed until properly fitted up.

It was decided to have Inspector William McCammon make an inspection of houses about which complaints have been made, the said report to be ready for the members to take up at their next meeting.

Mayor Richardson, in bringing the matter before the Board, said that the members would take the subject in hand. He felt that it was a matter that should receive immediate attention.

It was stated that in cases where houses were found to be in an unsanitary condition the Board had the power to condemn the houses and order alterations.

Several cases were referred to where families are living in very bad conditions, and the Board is very anxious to bring about a remedy as soon as possible. Action will be taken just as soon as a report is presented. It is felt that landlords should fix up these houses, and that with the increased rent they would receive they would be able to pay the cost of the alterations.

B. Blackhall, who has been a valuable member of the Board for some years, was on motion of Dr. A. R. B. Williamson, elected as chairman for the year 1916. The other members of the Board present were Mayor Richardson, Dr. L. E. Crowley, Dr. A. R. B. Williamson, Medical Health Officer, Hugh McBratney, William McCammon and W. S. Gordon, sanitary officers, and City Clerk Dr. W. W. Sands.

The Board decided to hold their regular meetings on the Friday preceding the second City Council meeting each month.

J. G. Fitzgerald, director of the antitoxin laboratory, Toronto University, wrote stating that on and after Feb. 1st the antitoxin laboratory of the Toronto University would discontinue supplying diphtheria antitoxin and other biological products in Ontario except on the order of the Provincial Board of Health. At that time the Provincial Board of Health will supply free of charge the following products: diphtheria antitoxin in vials, tetanus antitoxin in vials, smallpox vaccine, anti-meningitis serum in bottles, and rabies vaccine. Antitoxin, when supplied in syringe containers, will be supplied free, but twenty per cent. will be charged for the container.

There was some discussion as to just how the supplies would be handled, and it was decided to refer the matter to the medical men of the Board for an report to be submitted at the next meeting of the Board.

A request was received from Bajus Brewery and A. W. McLean to cut and store ice under the same conditions as last year. Last winter these houses were locked, and the key given over into the possession of the sanitary inspector, so as to prevent any of the ice for cooling purposes being used for domestic purposes.

On motion of Mr. McBratney, it was decided to grant the two requests under the same conditions as last year.

**SURPRISE FOR HOUSE.**

20-Year Collarless Member Appears "All Starched Up."  
 Washington, Jan. 19.—"Cyclone" Davis, Representative at large, from Texas, who has worn a collar for twenty years, surprised his colleagues in the House yesterday by appearing in a starched shirt and moderately high collar that met halfheartedly underneath his whiskers. The soft shirt and muffler that have expanded Adams' Apple were missing.

Mr. Davis told fellow members that he had found on his desk three Texas newspapers referring to him as the "collarless statesman" and now that he was in Washington he just guessed he would wear a white collar, although the thing didn't feel so comfortable.

At Yorkton, Sask., Pte. Harold W. Purvis, disabled and recently invalided home, by a vote of Conservatives receiving mail, was elected to the position of Postmaster, succeeding J. N. Clark, resigned. Purvis was seriously injured at Ypres.
