NEWS ABOUT TROOPS QUARTERED IN CITY

The 9th Artillery Brigade of the Canadian Expeditionary Force, third overseas division, is going to the front with the name "9th Kingston Artillery Brigade." In future, therefore, when the 9th Brigade reaches the front its work will be watched with close interest.

The 9th Brigade is more of an actual Kingston organization than any large unit that has yet left here. In the brigade are five batteries that have been organized and always trained here. The men have not all come from Kingston, but the great majority have come from the city and immediate vicinity. The 32nd Battery, under Major S. A. McKenzie, Gananoque, is composed of men from Gananoque and district. The 33rd Battery is under Major W. Sears, Kingston, and the great majority are Kingstonsians, although some have come from Peterboro and other places, as no unit is confined strictly to men who have resided in one place. The Ammunition Column, which up to a week ago was known as the 34th Battery, is under Major Masie, formerly of Cobourg, but late of Toronto. Major Masie has secured a large number of men from the Queen City, but they have been here for the last six months or more, and have made many friends. The 45th Battery will be taken from the R. C. H. A., the men of which have also been recruited in different places, but have been trained here for some months. The 46th Battery (formerly Queen's Battery) is composed of Queen's students and graduates and their friends. These men have been residing as far west as Vancouver, but have all at one time or another been residents of Kingston. It is to be hoped that some officer with a Kingston connection will be appointed brigadier.

In the batteries of the garrison, and now of the 9th Overseas Brigade, no time or energy is being spared to bring the batteries up to the highest state of efficiency in the shortest possible time. The syllabus is laid down by Lieut.-Col. Roy is being followed as closely as possible, as it is indeed well drawn up. By so doing the most work can be done before the brigade is ordered to proceed overseas, which it is understood will not be very long now.

The only recruits that are being taken on are the very best of men, and others are advised to go into other units where more time in training can be given. The poorer men of the units of the brigade that have not picked up the work fast enough are being sent elsewhere, so that the brigade when it leaves Kingston for the front will be of the highest standard that it is possible to make it.

The horses of the 33rd Battery are being sent from the Albion Hotel yard to the new stable recently erected near the Artillery Park Barracks. The horses were moved from Whitney Hotel stable a few days ago.

No. 1 Section, Divisional Ammunition Column, quartered in the Drydock Barracks, is proceeding in a satisfactory manner with the training of the men for the work. So far no horses have been obtained, but it is hoped that in the near future horses and wagons for the training of the men will be secured. The men of the column are of the highest standard obtainable, and Capt. Mills may well be proud of the men under his command, and be confident that No. 1 section will equal, if not surpass, any unit of the 3rd Overseas Division. The column is almost up to strength, and but few more recruits may now be taken on.

The establishment of a battery of the 3rd Division will be as follows: One major of captain, three subalterns, one B. S. M., two W. O., one Q. M. S., five sergeants, one sergeant, three (including corps), shoeing smiths, two saddlers, two wheelers, five corporals, nine bombardiers, fifty-one gunners, forty-six drivers, eight batmen and two A.S.C. drivers. There are forty in the headquarters party.

A number of the men of No. 1, D. A. C. are being inoculated, and as a consequence are off duty.

Lieut. E. B. Kingston, Lieut. G. H. Edgecombe, Lieut. O. B. Haycock and Lieut. McDougall, all of Ottawa, are attached to No. 1, D. A. C.

In the absence of Major McKenzie, Major Barrett is acting officer commanding the 32nd Battery.

As soon as the 9th Brigade leave Kingston it is altogether likely that there will be at least three depot batteries established here to take their place.

At the School of Signalling, opened in Kingston on Monday last under Lieut.-Col. D. E. Mundell, the greatest attention is being given to the forms of signalling that the men will use when they reach the front. In trench warfare as carried on in France now there is little, if any, use for flag signalling, but this is the
