### GR. EDWARD RYDER KILLED IN ACTION.

Veteran Kingston Batterymen Gives His Life For Empire.

The latest casualties contain the name of Gunner Edward Ryder of the Royal Canadian Horse Artillery, as being killed in action.

The death of Gunner Ryder is deeply regretted, particularly by the "old school" of the R.C.H.A., as the deceased was in the unit for twenty-eight years, enlisting in "A" Battery when he was twenty years of age. He was through the South African war and wore a Good Conduct medal. During all his time in the service he won for himself a high place in the esteem of his comrades.

When the brigade reached Salisbury Plain on the way to the front in October 1914, one of the first messages it received was to Gunner Ryder announcing the death of his wife in the city. She resided on Bagot street. Deceased is survived by his adopted daughter, Miss Laura Ryder.
