IT'S NOT READY YET

REPORT OF THE PROVINCIAL LICENSE COMMISSIONERS

No Appointment As Yet In the Position Occupied By the Late Clark W. Wright—Inspectors May Get Higher Salary.

No appointment has as yet been made to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Clark W. Wright, license inspector, and far as can be learned it will be some little time before the matter of an appointment, and the report on the licenses is given out. The Board has had a very busy time since being organized.

Report from Toronto states that owing to the great amount of work the Commission has been called upon to do it, it will be impossible for them to have their report ready for the Legislature. However, there may be a chance of the Commission getting its report in shape in time.

One report says that many of the inspectors in the province will be changed. Some of the inspectors are unfit, owing to age, ill-health, etc., and inability to enforce the law as it should be enforced. Inspectors are supposed to close up blind pigs, as well as watch hotels, but it is alleged that some of them have been forgetting this duty.

The question of the salary of inspectors is under consideration by the Commission, and it is believed that they will be given more money so that they will be able to devote all their time to this work. Inspectors only get about \$500, so that "inspecting and detecting" are only side-lines to their main means of livelihood.

There is much anxiety on the part of the liquor men in Kingston to know just what the Commission will report in regard to this city.

MOTHER THREATENED TO KILL BABY.
W. H. Wylie, Children's Aid Inspector, was in Harrowsmith on Friday investigating a case where a mother threatened to kill her nine-month-old child. The mother, Mrs. J. Smith, is thought to be slightly deranged and in a rage threatened to end the life of her little baby. She had to be removed to her father's home in Yarker, and Mr. Wylie handed the child over to the husband's sister-in-law.

G. A. WARBURTON COMING

Will Speak At The Prohibition Mass Meeting On Sunday Next.

This morning Dean Coleman, chairman of the "Committee of Fifty" received a telegram announcing that G. A. Warburton, chairman of "Executive" Committee of One Hundred, of Toronto, would be the speaker for the Mass Meeting in the Grand Opera House on Sunday next. The local committee is especially fortunate in securing Mr. Warburton, whom many of the citizens will remember quite well in connection with the Patriotic Campaign which was held in this city some time ago, and there will no doubt be a big crowd out on Sunday to hear this fluent speaker. Judge Lavell will preside at next Sunday's meeting and the Opera House orchestra assisted by best local vocalists, will provide a programme of music. It is expected that a large number of workers from the district, county municipalities will attend the meeting.

TRADES AND LABOR COUNCIL.

Elect Officers and Nominate a School Trustee. The Trades and Labor Council met on Thursday evening and the following officers were elected: Ernest Kane, president; J. Melville, vice-president; W. J. Driscoll, recording secretary; R. J. Wright financial secretary; J. Saive, treasurer. William Baxter, ex-president of the Council, was nominated as school trustee for Cataract Ward. The Trades and Labor Council is also considering putting a Labor candidate in the field for alderman in Cataract Ward, next year. The meeting was largely attended. The next regular meeting will take place the first Thursday in February.

War Time Photography.

A United States artillery officer has invented a camera that will photograph a motor shell at the instant it leaves the muzzle of the gun, showing even the curious "smoke ring" or "gas ring" that accompanies the emerging shell. The shutter which can be adjusted to make an exposure as short as 1-500 of a second is worked by electric motor, which makes several thousand revolutions a minute.

NO GRANTS TO ENEMIES.

To Be Allowed During Progress Of The War.

During the war no probate of a will or letters of administration of the estate of alien enemy whatever resident shall be granted of any assets in this province without the express license of the Crown. Where granted to persons entitled thereto, no portion of the assets shall be paid to any resident of a country at war with the British Empire without the express sanction of the Crown.
