## News of Troops in the City

The recommendation of the American Consul which was endorsed at the time by the commandant, Lieut.-Col. J. J. H. Fee, that a new roof be put on Fort Henry, has been adopted, and tenders have been asked for. Tenders for the new barracks are also being asked.

A number of parcels for the prisoners-of-war at Fort Henry arrived on Thursday afternoon. Every man who enlists in the 146th Battalion under Lieut.-Col. C. A. Low received forty-three different articles from the quartermaster's stores, according to a card that is being distributed by the recruiting offices. The card shows that the Militia Department is taking good care of those who enlist and looks after their personal comfort and appearance. It might be of interest to note that the Canadian soldier is the best equipped and best paid soldier in the world to-day. His equipment is as follows:

Clothing, Division "A"—Pair shoes, canvas, leather soles. Division "B"—Two pair boots, caps, greatcoats, serge jackets, puttees, shirts, trousers, cardigan waistcoats. Division "C"—Two pair boot laces, braces, cloth brushes, hair brushes, shaving brushes, tooth brush, sleeping caps, combs, grease, 2 oz., gloves, woolen, drawers, forks, housewives, holdalls, knives, razor with case, flannel shirts, winter shirts, socks, spoons, towels.

## WAS BADLY INJURED

REGINALD CRAWFORD HURT IN HOCKEY MATCH.  
At Brockville on Thursday Night—Brockville Player Skated Over Him—Frontenacs Badly Used.  
Reginald Crawford, who played centre for the Frontenac hockey seniors in Brockville on Thursday evening, had his left eye cut so badly that he may have a permanent injury. The game had been going only ten minutes when Crawford was tripped and fell near the boards. He had hardly reached the ice when one of the Brockville men skated over him, cutting him below and above the eye with his skate. He was taken from the rink to the Brockville Hospital. On Friday morning he was brought to the city by George VanHorne and taken to the Kingston General Hospital.

Reg Crawford has been playing hockey with the Frontenacs for a number of years, and this winter promised to be better than ever. In both games this season he developed wonderful form, and his loss will be a severe one to the team. The game at Brockville developed into a pitched battle between the Kingston and Brockville teams and supporters. Practically every man of the Frontenac team was used up. Even the referee was injured, and had to go to the hospital to have his wound dressed. In the fight, Ferguson had his face cut, and he will wear for two or three days the mark under his chin as a remembrance of the way the Brockvillians checked on one occasion. Derry has some body bruises, one of which he received from a spectator while skating close to the boards. Reid and Brouse were also in the fight, and received "little souvenirs." Cook used his goal stick with good effect, and came off better than the rest.

## PROHIBITION PETITION.

What Citizens Will Be Asked To Sign Next Week.  
The following is the exact wording of the petition which the voters of Kingston and Frontenac will be asked to sign this coming week: To the Premier and Government of the Province of Ontario:

Your petitioners, being (male) British subjects of the age of twenty-one years or over, and residents of the Province of Ontario.

Humbly pray:  
That the Government at the forthcoming session of the Legislature bring down a bill for the prohibition in this province, of the traffic in intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes, up to the limits of the powers of the Legislature, such bill to become law.

(a) When enacted by the Legislature, or in the alternative,  
(b) Upon submission to the electors and upon receiving the approval of a majority of the electors voting thereon.

And your petitioners as in duty bound will ever pray.
