

THE COUNTY COUNCIL

CHOOSES JAMES HALLIDAY, PORTSMOUTH, AS WARDEN.

The Standing Committees For the Year—Communications Read—Address Given by the Warden. James Halliday, reeve of Portsmouth, is the new Warden of Frontenac county. He was the unanimous choice of the council when it met on Tuesday afternoon for its inaugural session.

Warden Halliday addressed the council as follows: "We are beginning another year under the shadow of the greatest war in history. The world is still locked in deadly combat, but the determination of Great Britain and her Allies to conquer has not yet abated, and there can be but one end to the conflict, that is, the complete triumph of liberty over oppression."

"We will be called upon at this session to make further grants to the various patriotic funds. Let us deal with the matter in a broad, patriotic and generous spirit, that will enable us to feel that we are doing our duty, and assisting those who are offering up their lives that we may enjoy future peace and prosperity."

At the Warden's brief address, a committee was appointed to strike the standing committees for the year, and adjournment was made until Wednesday morning at ten o'clock. In Warden Halliday the Frontenac Council has one of the ablest men who ever occupied that position. He has been a member of the Portsmouth Council for years, and this is his second term as reeve of that village. —Kingston knows him well as he conducts an electrical business on King street, and is one of the leading electricians of the province. In religion he is an Anglican, being a member of St. John's Church choir, and in politics a Liberal. Big things are expected of him as Warden of Frontenac, for he has done big things for Portsmouth.

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ACCIDENT AT VERONA

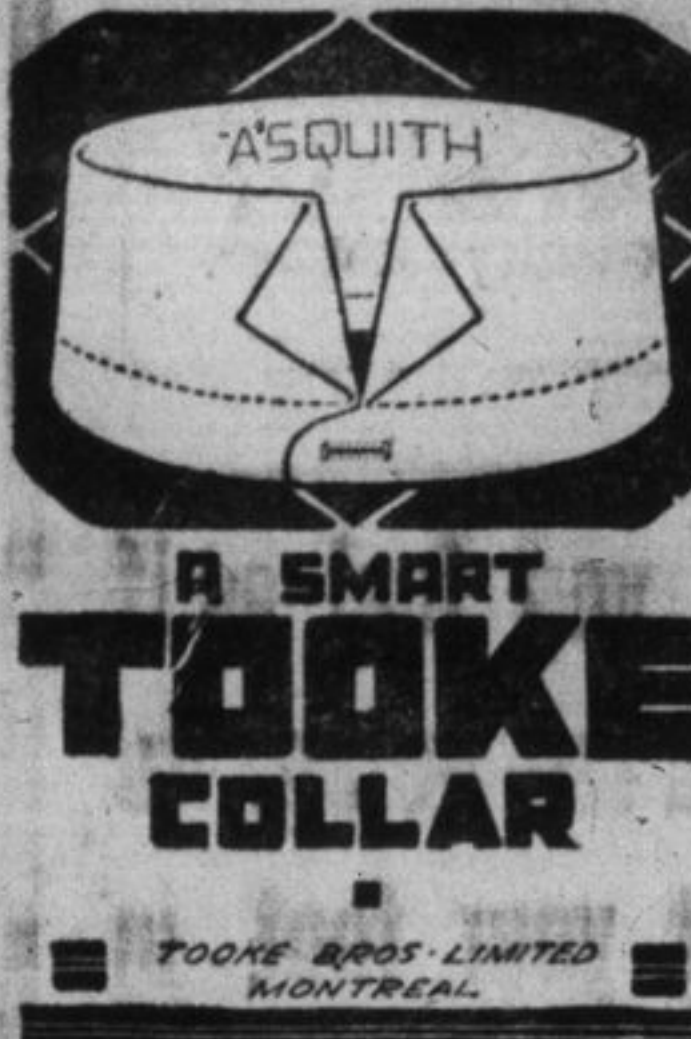
A BOY RUN OVER AND HIS THIGH BROKEN
