

### Alabama's Experience

In 1907 Alabama came under Prohibition with \$1,900,000 in the State Treasury and all outstanding obligations paid. Four years later the surplus had disappeared and in its place adeficit of over \$1,000,000. Governor Henderson says Prohibition cannot last through another legislature.


In the United States in 1907 the per capita consumption of liquor was a little over 23 gallons. In 1914, with 13,000,000 more people living under "dry" laws, the consumption of liquor per person was 25 gallons.

The Chief of Police of Topeka, Kansas, where Prohibition originated, reports 2,200 arrests in 1914 out of a population of 45,000. Over 30% -661-were jailed for drunkenness. Yet Kansas is a Prohibition State.

The sane judgment of the people of Ontario is against Prohibition. It was in June, 1914. It is now.

The present License System in Ontario is far superior to Prohibition. A change is not in the interest of the Province.
