ARTS '17 GAVE FAREWELL TO MEMBERS GOING OVERSEAS.

Affair Was Held on Thursday Evening in the Frontenac Hotel—An Interesting Programme of Toasts Carried Out.

Arts '17 held a most enjoyable banquet as a farewell to members who are going overseas as reinforcements for No. 5 Stationary Hospital (Queen's), on Thursday evening in the Frontenac Hotel. The president, K. C. Rappelle, presided, and Prof. O. D. Skeffton, honorary president, was toastmaster.
To the toast to "Kingston," the toastmaster said that forty-three members of Arts '17 were overseas. W. A. Irwin, in reply, stated that in Canada the King ruled by the will of the people and not by divine right. Mr. Rappelle, in proposing the toast to Arts '17, said that a year ago the clouds of war had made everything in life seem doubtful, but now in this second year the call to arms had become so well prepared that he was proud to belong to such a nation. The year had done well in the crisis, and the students had done and are still doing their duty.

A. Strader said that the year was doing its duty not only to the university but to the Empire. In sport, the reputation of Queen's had more than been upheld, and in sacrificing men for the war the year had kept up that reputation.

J. W. Sutherland, proposing "Our Guests," said that the year was proud of the men who were leaving. J. W. McKinnon, in responding, said that no other year in Arts had done so well as Arts '17. Those who were remaining at home would "Keep the Home Fires Burning." It was sometimes hard to stay at home, but the men going could understand that good reason, and would not forget it.

J. H. Corbett, in responding to the "Boys at the Front," said that Arts '17 had been organized thirty-nine months, with seventy members. There was at that time no thought of themselves to serve the university. When the call to arms came, dozens enlisted, and were now scattered all over the world. There were now forty-three out of that seventy.

J. A. McInnes, speaking in response to the toast, said that "loyalty" was a word often heard. Without a quick response to service and sacrifice if necessary it would only mean lip-loyalty.

Dr. Skeffton said that he hoped all would be back in a year or two to keep Queen's from becoming a female seminary. He was proud to be even an adopted member of the university now. People do not seem to realize the tremendous magnitude of the conflict. He hoped that the men of '17 would bring back all kinds of V. C.'s and D. S. O.'s after the war. The struggle was one of civilization against barbarism, and those who went were most certainly loyal.

R. J. Davidson toasted "The Ladies," and said that the ladies of '17 justified all kinds of toasts. In the world there was a place for women as well as in the home, and they were playing a part to make things easier for the men at the front. He referred to the good work of the nursing sisters.

K. C. Maitland responded. He stated that the men would receive the most of the credit in the victory, but the women had deserved the most credit. The war had shown the qualities of the nursing sisters, and of those working for the Red Cross Society.
