Military and Political Situation Creates Grave Uneasiness in the Central Power Capitals. Sofia, Jan. 31.—The situation in Roumania has for several days been increasingly occupying the interest of political and diplomatic circles here. The agitation of the Quadruple Entente in Bucharest continues in undiminished strength, and although no positive results have been achieved as yet in Roumania, still a situation lowers and the Allies cannot allow to continue in the future without serious reflection, for the weak attitude of the present Roumanian Government has brought it about that well-informed circles here are receiving a continuously more unfavorable impression of conditions in Roumania, both from an economic and military point of view. Under great difficulties an agreement was reached with Roumania for the export of 50,000 carloads of grain to Austria and Germany, but many and varied obstacles have been placed in the way of the execution of the agreement. Advertisements of the British Legation continue to appear daily in the Roumanian papers inveigling Roumanian farmers and grain dealers to offer their stock to the legation and its agents, and the result of this manoeuvre is that not only are the prices of grain being forced higher, but also Roumanian freight cars are so loaded with these purchases that the export of grain to Austria and Germany threatens to come to a standstill. The military situation in Roumania has occupied the attention of Sofia's political and diplomatic circles to an even greater extent. Although Roumania has not thus far ordered a general mobilization, still, four-fifths of the Roumanian army is under arms. The greater part of these troops are concentrated along the Bulgarian and Hungarian frontiers, while the troops along the Bessarabia border have not been particularly reinforced, and a great part of Roumania's heavy coast artillery still garri is brought from the Black Sea. It is clear that this states of affairs claims the greatest attention of the Central Powers and their Allies in view of the Entente's continued agitation in Bucharest. In view of these facts it is only natural that gradually the pressure of necessity may result in inducing Roumania to make its attitude more plain. The Central Powers and their Allies do not lack the means to accomplish this. The English and French will have only themselves to blame if their actions toward Greece point out the way for the Central Powers in the above connection.

NO CONSCRIPTION IN CANADA. Says Hon. Dr. Roche at Meeting in Chicago. Chicago, Feb. 1.—Canada governs itself, and is not influenced by Great Britain in any way; conscription never will be adopted in the Dominion, and there are no war taxes on Canadian land, and never will be. These were some of the assertions here by Dr. William J. Roche, Minister of the Interior of Canada, at Crawford Norris, premier of Manitoba, at a meeting of Canadian immigration-agents from the United States. The meeting is designed to outline methods of informing American people who planned to take up homesteads in Canada of the actual conditions in their Dominion.

WAR BULLETINS. The northeastern counties of England were raided by a fleet of Zeppelins Monday night. The damage was slight. Relations between United States and Germany are grave. No settlement of the Lusitania affair by arbitration can be made. Food riots occurred in Berlin and six persons were killed. Durazzo, Albania, was bombarded by Austrian aviators who dropped leaflets telling the Serbs to go back into Serbia. Germany is furnished the Turks with six submarines to operate in the Sea of Marmora. When some men get a chance to praise themselves they usually make a noise like a megaphone.
