TRANSPORT MAN WRITES

About Conditions in England—Many
Soldiers Have Colds.

Sergeant Groom, Army Ser-
vice Corps, has received a very inter-
esting letter from Pte. W. Ingham,
formerly of Belleville, and now over-
seas with the Mechanical Transport
that was trained by the sergeant-
major at Cobourg. The letter is
dated January 21st at Grove Park,
Lee, S. E. England, and reads in
part as follows:

"We were moved here last Mon-
day and have been on the go all
week, out for driving tests and get-
ting fixed up. We were paid to-
day, up to date. They sent 15¢ of
the bunch to Shorncliffe. The ma-
jority of them failed in their tests,
and I believe that they are trans-
ferred to the Canadian Army Service
Corps. Some of them were tried
on Fords for service in German East
Africa, but give me a truck. I was
out on an A. England and a Daulier
and was never on a truck before.

"They took some of our pea-jack-
ets and leggings away and replaced
them with infantry great-coats and
puttees. They gave them back,
however, to the men who returned to
Shorncliffe today.

"One can go to London from here
in a night, but I have not been there
yet. We are all nearly dead with
cold. I have four bottles of medi-
cine in my pockets now.

Feeding the Calf.

With the new-born calf it is the
common practice to allow it to suck
the cow for a short time. It is ad-
visable to allow it to suckle the cow
for a few times, at least, as it sup-
plies the calf with the colostrum,
which it requires.

For the first two or three weeks
of its life the young calf should re-
ceive whole milk, after this time it
is safe to feed skim milk, taking a
week or so to gradually make the
change. As the calf increased in
weight the amount should be in-
creased until it is receiving from
eight to ten pounds of skim milk
at each feeding. Skim milk, fresh
from the separator, is good food.
Care should be taken to see that all
lact is removed from the milk.

When it reaches a suitable age
whole oats is a splendid food for the
young calf. If mixed with a little bit
of bran it will be all the better, but
no more should be fed than the calf
will eat up clean. As the calf gets
older milk may be fed at a lower
temperature, but at first it should be
as near the natural temperature of
milk as it comes fresh from the cow
as possible.
