TREATMENT OF SUSPECTS.

The Police Department should make itself familiar with the proceedings of other cities in the matter of dealing with offensive aliens. Kingston, above all places in Ontario, a military centre, and the site of an enemy internment camp, should certainly have no weak or half-hearted policy with regard to the Austro-German invaders.

The one peculiar thing about the situation is that the police, the men on the street, are quite alert, and that to their diligence is due the fact that the city has so few persons of suspicious presence and service.

When the suspects are called to the City Hall, however, there does not seem to be any definite plan of disposing of their cases. Four or five Germans were arrested in one day, (including a woman), and after being looked over they were released.

They were quite as worthy of a lodgment in the fort as most of those who are interned there. Let us have no child's play in dealing with the people who are disposed to do harm whenever they can, who are typical of their class in the hall.

THE MARRIED TEACHERS.

A committee of the Toronto Board of Education has under consideration the question, Should the women teachers be allowed to remain on the school staff after marriage?

The subject came before the management committee through the continued service of one who had married,

who was in most comfortable circumstances, and who kept some needly out of employment.

A second case was that of a teacher who wanted her name changed in the records and pay cheques.

The Board will consider whether the married women should be continued on the teaching staff.

One must recall the experience of certain teachers in New York. The Board proceeded to drop out of its employment some who desired to keep their positions, though they went out of school work for a considerable time.

The teachers had influential advocates in the Legislature, and they amended and reconstructed the law so that the Board could not dismiss or remove them.

The Legislature was in favor of the teachers, and they won out in their suits. Some of them succeeded in actions for large arrears of salary which the Board had refused to pay.

It may be that this course will be adopted in Ontario, and its Legislature may be appealed to. No one can surmise what its members may suggest or do upon the matter being referred to them.

CLOSE UP THE CONTRACT.

The Street Railway Company's re-

presentatives and the members of the Utilities Commission had a meeting on Thursday afternoon, and made some progress towards an agreement.

Certain things have been settled. The rate is to be 1.20 per kilo-watt hour,

and the contract is to run for ten years from the date of its adoption.

The poles on the streets along the line of the streetcar are to belong to the company, the poles which do not carry lamps. The other iron poles, bearing lamps, are to belong to the Commission.

The one point over which the difference of opinion has occurred is covered by clause seven of the proposed agreement. It provides for the cancellation of the agreement in

the event of the city or company entering into a contract for Hydro power. The Railway Company objects because a change of power, from steam to hydro, involves the installation of a transformer at the power station and for the adaptation of the current to the purposes of the railway. The cost of this transformer will be about \$10,000. The company does not want to invest in it, and the commissioners do not see why they should.

There is a serious disadvantage in delay. The company contemplates changes in their plant, and do not want to make them until this contract for power has been completed. The question is, would public opinion approve of the city's purchase of the transformer? The Whig, which cannot be accused of any unfriendliness or unfairness towards the railway company, does not think it would.

Delay in closing up a contract which in most cases is so favorable to the company must therefore be regretted very much.

A public meeting in Toronto has demanded the removal of all Germans, whether naturalized or not, from public positions in Canada. This may suggest a hardship in some cases, but it is justifiable by the conduct of some of the Teutons.

THE WEST COAL SUPPLY.

Great anxiety has been felt in the west because of the shortage of coal, and a special commission in Saskatchewan composed of a representative of the city and of the Board of Trade, has to be thanked for a luminous and satisfactory report. The terrors of a very severe winter, without fuel, may be imagined, but they cannot be described.

The situation in the west is not as serious as it was supposed to be. The coal, soft, is procured in plentiful quantities in the provinces and that has not been as procurable as usually in the larger towns and cities due to two facts.

The railways have not been able to convey it from the mines as fast as it has been needed through a shortage of cars or mode of power. The consumption of coal is greater.

The demand in the country districts has been most unusual. "The good crop," says the report of the special commission, "has saved a number of farmers the necessity of going to the bush for fuel and they are using coal instead of chopping wood."

For a few days there was talk of a fuel famine, but at the last account the stress had been somewhat relieved.

The fear is that the mining will now become deficient. The men at work at Rosedale and Rosedale have gone elsewhere for more regular employment, and this may have a new effect and one most unpleasant to contemplate in the very cold weather.

LICQUOR IN SASKATCHEWAN.

The liquor law which is peculiar to Saskatchewan has been in force for a year and it appears to be working well, much better indeed than it was expected to do. There were lugubrious thoughts with regard to it when it was proposed. The Province, the organ of the opposition, pre-

dicted:

"In three years there will surely be a dispensary in every village in Sas-

katchewan. Instead of forty whole- sale houses, there will be four hundred dispensaries. A corrupt Government will be maintaining itself in office by further corruption, entailing the debauchery of the voters. A venal police will control the adminis-

tration of the law just as their police masters desire. Drunkenness and crime will be more prevalent than under the open bar room to-day."

Were these predictions verified.

No. The Government's plan was clear and comprehensive. At once it abolished 406 bars, 38 wholesale stores, and 11 clubs, and the licenses of three railway systems. There was no parallel to this in all Canada. The Government protested fearlessly and with no doubt as to the result.

True, the dispensaries remain, but under conditions that did not en-

courage the consumption of liquor.

In place of greater drunkenness, there was less of it, crime very largely disappeared, and whole communities felt a change and an uplift of the most desirable kind.
