## News of Troops in the City

On Sunday morning the 146th Battalion under Lieut.-Col. C. A. Low paraded to the Salvation Army for divine service. Brigadier and Mrs. Morehen were present. The Brigadier preached the sermon and Mrs. Morehen gave an address. Capt. C. Milton, staff chaplain, read the prayer. During the service Mrs. (Estigny) Smith sang a solo in giving an address. Mrs. Morehen spoke feelingly of the wonderful way that Canadians had answered the call to duty. The Salvation Army had taken its part with the remainder and she was glad to be able to announce that it had given ten bandmasters to the Canadian Expedition force. Besides this number, however, were over 200 musicians, over 40,000 Salvationists in the Imperial Army.

In his sermon the Brigadier spoke feelingly of the late Capt. George Richardson. Though he had never met him personally he knew by the esteem in which he was held by his friends that he had been a man of sterling qualities.

C. H. A. His promotion to a commission is well deserved, and is merely a reward for the excellent service he has rendered.

### TO CONTINUE HIS STUDIES

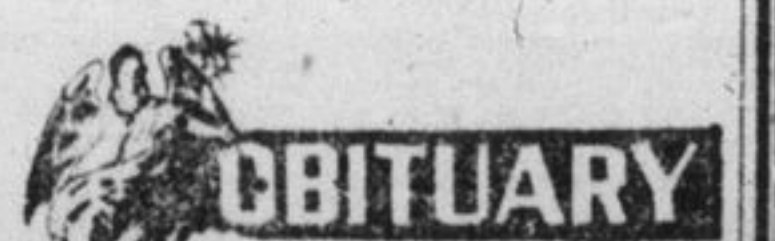
As An Electrical Engineer in London, England.

Lieut. Baker graduated from Queen's University in the spring of 1915 with the degree of B. Sc. He is a qualified electrical engineer.



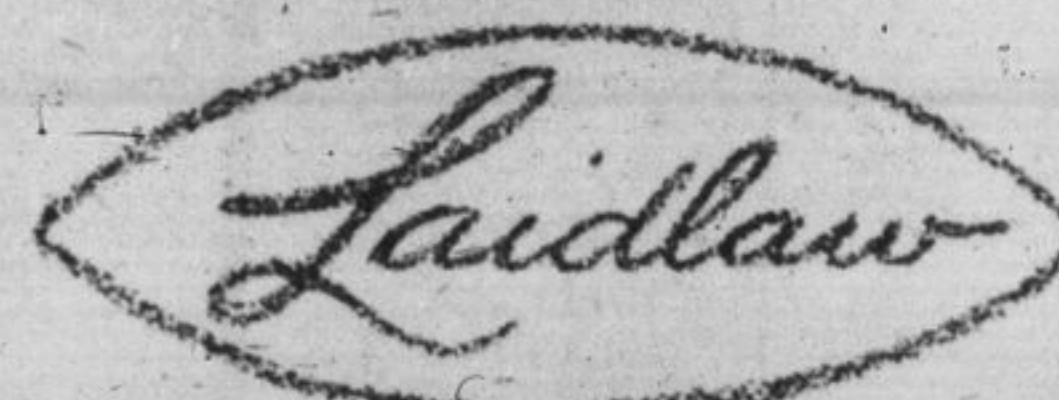
### OBITUARY
