STORMY WEATHER HINDERS FIGHTING.

On Both the Western and the Eastern Fronts.

(Special to the Whig) London, Feb. 16.—Stormy, rainy weather put a stop to heavy artillery fighting along the western front last night, but furious infantry combats occurred both around Ypres and in the Champagne region. These struggles, however, resulted in no important changes in the general situation.

The French War Office made no claims of important successes for the French in the fighting in the Champagne, reporting merely the recapture of some communicating trenches east of the Tahure Somme. Py road in hand grenade assaults. The rest of the front was quiet last night, Paris reported.

Stormy weather has also held the Austro-German and Russian troops to their trenches on the eastern front. Berlin this afternoon reported heavy snowstorms all along the battle line.
