News of Troops in the City

Three soldiers returned from the front arrived at the Elmhurst Convalescent Home on Wednesday. Their names and addresses are: Pte. Albert Edward Gilman, 1st Battalion, No. 6 Scott street, St. Thomas; Pte. Inghalt Nyhan, 1st Battalion, Iola, Sask.; Pte. Ernest Hutcheson, 1st Battalion, 38 Glebe street, Galt. The men arrived at 2.30 p.m. by C. P. R., and were driven to the Elmhurst Home. They left on Thursday for their homes.

The Ottawa Free Press says: "Ten battalions, counting the batteries, are now seeking recruits in Ottawa. The last to enter the tourney is the 146th, of Kingston, represented by Lieut. Frederick James, who has been given desk room in the Arcade office. Lieut. James is anxious to secure former Kingston boys for his battalion. Others, of course, will be accepted, but there are many former residents of Kingston and the district, for whose services an especial effort will be made."

It is learned from Ottawa that the organization of a Canadian Officers' Overseas Battalion in the immediate future is being considered. The idea is to take overseas officers who have taken the required courses for their rank, but who are without appointments. Only men of commissioned officers' rank will be eligible. The battalion will be distinguished by a uniform different from that of the ordinary overseas units. Men in such a corps would be in a better position to understand the position of a private in the ranks, and to acquire training in some special line, such as machine gun work, which would be of use when drafted later. There are about 1,200 officers in Kingston, Toronto and London divisional areas who are at present without appointments.

The armorers' course will start on Monday, February 21st. One man from each unit in the division will be permitted to attend.

Lieut. R. C. Williams of the 49th Regiment has been appointed signaling officer of the 30th Belleville Battalion.

There is such a class of the Royal School of Artillery that it is divided into two brigades of three batteries each for instructional purposes. The two brigades alternate in taking field work, which is taken at Barriefield. The gun-drill is taken on the square or on the ice of the harbor.

Wednesday night there was a very interesting checker tournament for the soldiers of the city. It was run off at the Military Y. M. C. A. hall. Fourteen contestants took part. After three rounds there were but two men, Pte. T. Miles and Lance-Corpl. C. Lake, who had not suffered defeat. These two played a match of three games for first place, and Pte. Miles emerged victorious. C. V. Farmer, the secretary, in declaring the winner, said the prize for the contest would be presented at the concert to be given Thursday evening.

The members of the Young People's League of the Sydenham Street Methodist Church are putting on a programme at the Military Y.M.C.A. Thursday night at 7.30 o'clock. All soldiers in Kingston are invited to attend.

Nine members of the Belmont Battery, Peterboro, reached Kingston yesterday. Major the Rev. J. C. Davidson addressed the men at the Peterboro' Armouries. The 92nd Battalion, headed by the band, paraded the men to the G. T. R. station, where they were given a hearty send-off by their brothers-in-arms and friends.

THEATRICAL NEWS

Edwin Stevens in "The Man Inside."

Edwin Stevens, the noted Broadway star, comes to the Strand tonight and for the balance of the week in the Universal Feature production, in five reels, "The Man Inside." To-night Harry Lauder's Play.

Speaking of Harry Lauder's play that comes to the Grand to-night the Toronto Globe says:

"The Night Before," Harry Lauder's initial contribution as a playwright had a cordial reception from a large and enthusiastic audience at the Royal Alexandra Theatre last night. The piece comprises three acts, and in each of them there is an abundance of mirth, melody and pawky Scottish humor. The story deals with the wedding of Jimmy Morrison, a plumber, and Bessie MacBeth, the bonnie daughter of well-doing Scottish villagers, and the incidents portrayed are delightfully entertaining in character—particularly in the third act, where a typical presentation of the old Scotch custom of "heating the house" on the night before the wedding is given. In this scene a piper plays to the Highland dancing of one of the guests, and a fiddler obliges the company with "Auld Robin Gray," while no fewer than four of the members of the cast contribute refreshing vocal numbers. The cast has been excellently selected, and all perform their parts well-nigh faultlessly. The orchestral programme is a treat in itself, comprising as it does many of the choicest of Scotland's musical gems.

"Daddy Long Legs."

"Daddy Long Legs," the biggest dramatic success of this and last season, has been booked for appearance at the Grand for two nights commencing Tuesday, Feb. 22nd with a matinee on Wednesday. The play, a dramatic version of the "Daddy Long Legs" written by Jean Webster, was produced nearly two years ago at Powers' Theatre in Chicago, where it ran twenty-five weeks to capacity business. It has just ended an entire year's engagement to the Grand Theatre in New York. Last winter, during a limited California tour, the play smashed every record in the history of the state by running for five weeks at the Columbia Theatre in San Francisco, a significant achievement. This play has the additional advantage of exceedingly elaborate and costly stage settings.

Boulton (Rimouski) in the Commons yesterday, Sir Robert Borden said that the Government had decided to conduct investigations into the status and conduct of every German and Austrian holding position in the civil service.
