 The 3rd Divisional Area in the first two weeks of February enlisted 1,888 recruits or over 200 more than in the previous two weeks. There has been an unprecedented stimulus to recruiting in the Division and the effects are shown in the official returns that come in semi-monthly. These returns are actual figures and not based on guess work of what are the probabilities. There is therefore not the slightest shadow of a doubt but that the 3rd Division for the last two months has shown a steady increase in the number of recruits and there is reason in believing that before long four complete battalions will be recruited in this part of Ontario every four weeks. This is a wonderful record and compares more favorably with any part of Canada. It shows that the residents of this old part of Canada realize the imperative call for men assisting in every way the work of the recruiting staffs and devising schemes to secure recruits that are proving successful.
 In the artillery units of Kingston there were 173 men taken on the strength. No. 5 Stationary Hospital secured 152 civilians for the ranks and the 146th Battalion received a total of 102. This brings the total up to 425 men to join Kingston units in the last two weeks.
 In relation to other battalions authorized at the same time and on the same basis, the 146th Battalion comes fifth of nine battalions in the district. The 59th, 77th and 80th took on a very few recruits but were practically completely organized when the Militia Council gave the authority for the 93rd, 109th, 130th, 136th, 139th, 146, 154th, 155th and 156th.
 There are to-day 31,235 officers, N.C.O.'s and men in this division.
