FRONTENACS VICTORS

Frontenacs deserved to win as they played the better hockey from the first period on. Cook in goal blocked some very hard shots. During the last period the Queen's goal-judge claimed that Queen's scored a "hunk" but the referee disagreed with him.

The First Period.

It was 8.28 when Oscar Bernhart the referee called the players to the centre of the ice. Box soon got his hands on the puck but failed to puncture the Frontenacs' net. What of the Volunteering.

Conflicting reports come of the rate of volunteering in Canada. The official militia statement is that it is satisfactory; that the average of enlistment in January was nearly a thousand a day. On the other hand, from many places come statements that recruiting is slack. It is slack in Ottawa. In St. John, N.E., according to the St. John Times, there was one recruit a day last week. St. John has 50,000 people.

The honor of Canada is pledged to 500,000 men. Honor is pledged; because we have no right to name such a figure without a determination to make it good. We must not put up a cheap bluff. Being so pledged, common sense dictates that Canada must raise these troops as rapidly as possible.

What does "as rapidly as possible" mean? It means that the matter should not be left to haphazard. It means that there should be no definite campaign in Canada to promote recruiting. No campaign of the kind is in existence. The matter is being left to the efforts of officers of authorized battalions. Government should not be content with that. There should be an organized campaign of information and education—advertisements, pictures and newspaper advertising.

Canada ought not to run any risk of discrediting herself by talking in January 1916 of half a million men, and showing only 300,000 or so a year later.
