Licensed Commissioners Now at Work Upon List of Cut-offs.

The Ontario Board of License Commissioners is at present hard at work upon the list of "cut-offs" and although nothing official has been given out, it is reported that a startling list of license holders will have to seek new occupations after May 1st.

It is stated that an announcement for the entire province will be made within ten or fifteen days, but until then the identity of the "doomed" is being carefully guarded.

Montreal, Feb. 19.—Lieut. "Duster" Reid, who left for active service in the European war with the 22nd Westmount Rifles and was afterwards transferred to the 3rd Battalion, C.E.F., was a visitor in Montreal yesterday. Lieut. Reid is home on sick leave, after having been confined for nearly three months in a hospital in England. He has lost the use of three fingers on his left hand and will undergo an operation on reaching his home in London, Ontario, for which place he left last night.

Lieut. Reid was one of the champion McGill rugby teams for 1913 and 1914.

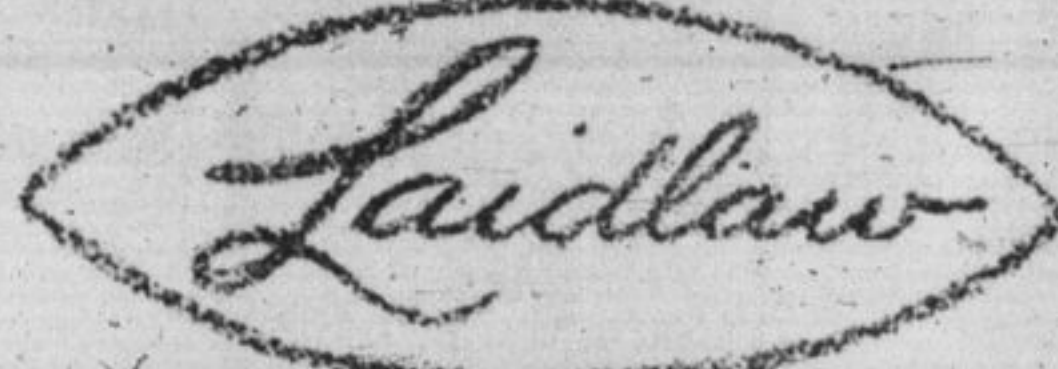
