APPEAL TO YOUNG SINGLE MEN AND RECRUITS

Made By J. Russell Forster - To Many Have Not Given The Question Very Serious Consideration.

The need of men is being constantly placed before our people by the recruiting officers and the various patriotic speakers leagues, and while success is reported in most centres there are doubtles many eligible for service overseas who have not yet given the matter their very serious consideration, or recognized the advisability of taking advantage of the present splendid opportunity for military training that would fix them to defend our possessions.

It is to these young single men and parents that this appeal is addressed. There is no doubt that as Canadian citizens and British subjects it is our duty to answer the call of our country in time of war. Loyulty occupies a large place in the hearts of all British subjects of British parentage. It was a fixed principle in the hearts of our earliest settlers and the guide of all their actions, The United Empire Loyalists in fidelity to this principle left their homes of comparative opulence to face the regions or the wilderness here Here indeed is a lesson in fidelity to principle and fortitude in adversity. No harvest moon her smiling night kept; no village nestled on these desolate - hills; no pastures green, nor waving crops, as now, stretched to the setting sun and awake hosannas unto nature's God. Belgium was enjoying peace and prosperity when the criminal Huns despoiled her with fire and sword; but may we not say, with feelings of profound thankfulness, that the boundary of Canada has been worked out by the finger of God, a land for giants to dwell in?

Under the benficient guardianship of Britain we have pursued our way unmolested for a century and our fathers with prophetic vision and faith in the high destiny of our country and our race laid here the foundation of a nation as enduring as those of the Laurentian Hills and the Rockies whose passes they pierced. The axe of the loyalist has long since carroded with the clay that wielded it, but will any one say his spirit does not live? Shah we say O' Canada, my beloved country, soil made sacred by the ashes of those who sleep ! and cry aloud that these ashes resuscitate and seize again the sword to maintain the principles by which they lived and for which they died? No! but hearing he clarion-call the tocsins alarm to an inborn sense of responsible citizenship we will answer in the spirit of our ances-

ters who heard it in Albron's Hills. Edmund Burke, that illustrious British statesman, contemporary of our own loyalists, in writing his "Reflections" upon the political and so-cial changes of his day said "that with the passing of the age of chivalry the glory of civilization departed forever and that it has been succeeded by an age of sophists, economists and calculators; that never, never more shall we behold that generous loyalty to rank and sex, that dignified obedience, that subordination of the heart that kept alive even in the age of servitude itself the spirit of an exalted freedom; the unbought grace of life, the cheap defence of nations, the nurse of manly sentiment and heroic enterprise is gone. It is gone too -that sensibility of principle, that chastity of honour which felt a stain like a wound, which inspired courage, a wound, which inspired courage, whilst it mitigated ferocity, which ennobled whatever it touched and under which vice lost half its evil by losing all its grossness." This prophecy has been in large measure fulfiled in Germany but Heaven forbid that it should ever be applied to Canada. The issue of this war is liberty and righteousness versus tyranny, and Canada has a vital interest in the outcome. If the Allies fail, we shall see the triumph of "militarism," German domination and the subversion of Anglo-Saxon civilization, which is the highest the world has ever seen. While we hear frequent mention of British liberty does the popular mind fully appreciate the meaning of this? Free-dom of conscience, freedom to work out individual destiny and to attain the maximum of happiness consistent with marility and the responsibilities of citizanship: that is the spirit of British law which makes liberty commensurate with, and inseperable from, British rule; which proclaims even to the stranger and the sojourner the moment he sets his foot upon British earth that the ground upon which he stands is holy and consecrated by the genius of universal freedom; no matter in what language his doom may have been pronounced; no matter what complexion incampateable with freedom an Indian an African or an American sun may have burned upon him; no matter in what disastrous battle, his liberty may have been cloven down, or if his creed be Protestant, Roman Catholic, Hindu or Mahometan, the moment he touches British earth his soul walks abroad in her own majesty, his body ! swells beyond the measure of the chains which burst from round him. and he stands redeemed, regenerated and disenthralled by the irresistable genius of universal freedom. If this be worthy of Canada, is Canada worthy of this?


