## POLITICAL PATRONAGE

DISAPPROVED AND SEVERELY DENOUNCED BY FOSTER.

All the Troubles of the Government Due To It—A Suggested Agreement Against It—Words of Wisdom and Power.

In the Commons on Thursday last Sir George Foster lifted his voice against political patronage and jobbery. His speech (taken from the Star), in two points will have a great influence on the land. He said: "There are expenditures now, there have been expenditures from Confederation onwards, which were neither useful nor expedient. It has been done under all Governments. It probably is being done under this Government. My opinion is that until a different method is pursued, in respect to our expenditure upon public works, in their authorization, we shall be bound to continue to open to those abuses. My view is that every application for a public work should go before a competent board of engineers and business men and should be reported upon by them for the information of the Government, and that every application will have to show some cause of necessity, of public benefit, or of future usefulness, before it should be passed and put into the estimates. I do not believe we will ever get down to a proper system of husbanding the resources of our country or of confining ourselves to useful and necessary public works until we get some measure of that kind."

"I have been thirty years in public life. I have been a pretty close student of the political parties and history of this country. In the whole course of that thirty-four years I

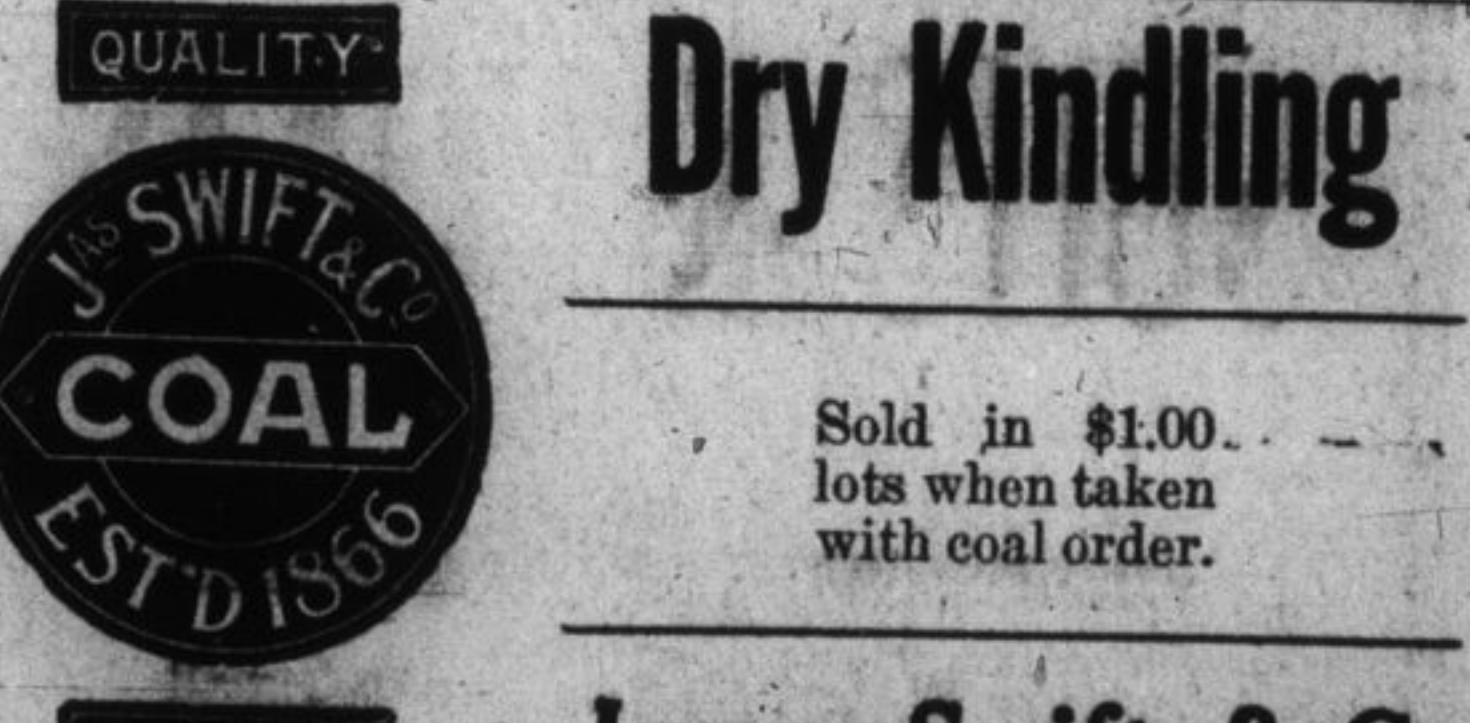
