Young men between the ages of eighteen and twenty-three are accepted for long service, and between nineteen and thirty-eight for the period of the war.

The privates' pay in the Artillery branch is from \$8. 2d. to \$9. 4d. a week, and in the Infantry branch from \$8. 2d. to \$9. 11d.

During the first two or three weeks of his training the recruit is instructed in the duties of sentries, etc., he is employed on fatigue and standards for war recruits.
