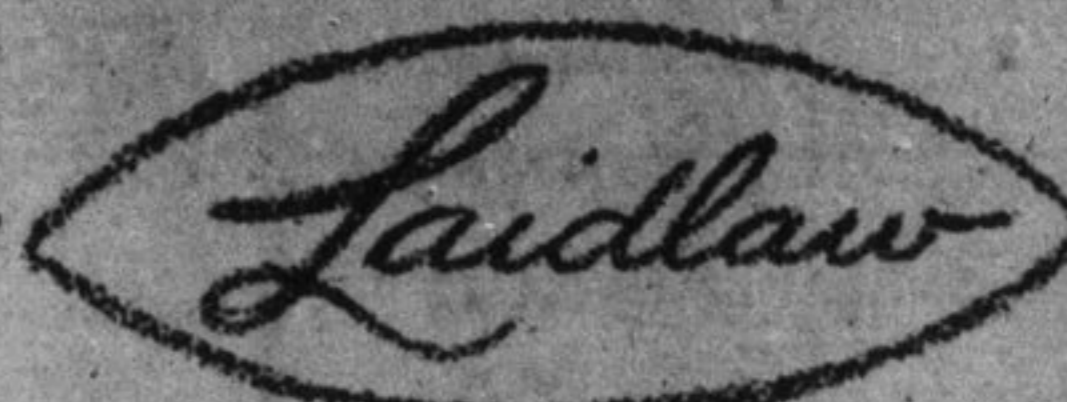
Lieutenant: Who's the idiot that told you to leave that pile of rubbish in front of headquarters?
