### News of Troops in the City

Every available minute of a soldier's time is taken up with drill work but the medical authorities insist that sufficient recreation hours should always be given and that they are just as important to the welfare of the soldier training for service at the front as are sufficient drill hours. Every man must have a certain amount of time to himself or he will grow "rigid" like any one in civilian life. If he works hours and hours every day and every night it is not very long before his work becomes poorer and poorer and in the long run it does not justify the sacrifice. Looking ahead probably more than the average civilian employer, the soldier is better taken care of by the military authorities. He has holidays every little while and while his work begins early in the morning it finishes at 5 o'clock in the afternoon. Every Saturday is a holiday. The impression that life is a continual round of work for the man in khaki is certainly wrong. He works hard but the hours are comparatively short. They are better than in most civilian occupations.

To take care of the spare time so that it will be used and not abused every possible effort is made. There are three places in the city where soldiers can spend their time reading, writing or playing games. The Millia Y.M.C.A., at Brock street church, is of course the most convenient for all of the soldiers and is becoming more and more valuable to the men of their spare time. Here there is a telephone, writing tables, game tables and every possible material help for men to pass a quiet hour. The same conditions exist for the soldier in St. Andrew's Hall and in the Khaki Club at the foot of Princess street. The men of the 146th Battalion, beside all these places, have a recreation room in their barracks. The men of the batteries at the Drydock Barracks can spend their spare time in the large ground floor dining hall and recreation room. The men in the Rideau Barracks have their reading room. Every one of the places is well fitted up. Owing to the fact that few of the soldiers are in the city long enough to gather around them very many civilian friends the places are always crowded.

Lieut. M. W. MacDowell, in charge of recruiting of the 156th Battalion at Gananoque has been transferred to "B" Company of the 59th Battalion, Brockville. He is anxious to get overseas. Lieut. G. R. Robinson will take Mr. MacDowell's place in the 156th.

Issac Desmond, aged seventeen son of Capt. F. Desmond, Tonawanda, N. Y., has been released from the 59th Battalion, Gananoque, for being under age and a United Stateser. He left his home some months ago and two weeks ago was located. Then the family sought the aid of U. S. Consul Foster at Ottawa and the discharge arranged. The lad at first objected to leaving the 59th as he wanted to go overseas.

One night last May our battalion

was making a night march (which usually lasted from 8 p.m. until about 5 a.m., as we covered the length of the British line in these night marches such as this one). It was about 1 a.m., the hour when you usually get "sunn-out," and every one is trading "sunn-out" and "mille after mille," and wondering how much further you have to go. We heard another battalion approaching and all along the line ran the order "Feel your right!" Shortly they were marching past and many were the queries "Who are you?" and they answered West Ridings. Who are you?" One of our boys, who was evidently not asleep, even though he was tired out, answered: "Canadians walking!"

The members of the Reserve Brigade, C. F. A. Ross Barracks, Shorncliffe are asking for sporting material, for those at present there and the many returning daily from the trenches. Subscribers are invited to donate some trifle to assist in purchasing baseball and football uniforms. C. Adams, Q. M. S., C. F. A., & R. C. H. A., president sports committee, will be glad to receive the contributions.

Eight invalided soldiers are expected to arrive in the city this afternoon for the Convalescent Homes.

The train carrying the reinforcements for No. 7 General Hospital (Queen's) did not leave the city on Monday until after three o'clock owing to the lateness of the through train. The train made the waiting very uncomfortable.
