### DECLINED TO MOVE THE DIVORCE BILLS.

**Speaker Has Difficulty in Getting Measures Read First Time.**

Ottawa, March 1.—Mr. Speaker Seivigny of the House of Commons found the Parliamentary atmosphere very unsympathetic to divorce at yesterday afternoon's sitting of the House. The order paper contained notice for the first reading of five Senate bills granting divorces. With the exception of one of these bills, which stood in the name of W. A. Boys, all were in blank. The Speaker had considerable difficulty in securing movers and seconders for the first reading of each of these bills. In turn the members designated by him rose and declined, some seven in turn taking this position. Finally, however, the secured members who permitted their names to be used "for routine purposes."

### COUNTY COUNCIL CALLED.

To Meet on March 14th to Consider Assessment Equalization.  
J. W. Bradshaw, county clerk, has been authorized by Warden Halliday to call a special meeting of the County Council on March 14th at 3.30 p.m., for the purpose of passing a by-law confirming the equalization of assessment for the purpose of county valuation and other business. The council will also be asked to confirm the awarding of the contract for supplies for the new vaults at the Court House to the Office Specialty Co. of Toronto. The contract price is about \$450, and is for the fittings of the vaults. The contract was awarded at a recent meeting of the County Property Committee.

### Spring Assizes Next Week.

There will be one jury and two non-jury cases for the Spring Assize which opens on Tuesday next before Sir Justice Clute. There are no criminal cases entered yet, though some may be brought down at any time. Wednesday was the last day for entering civil cases.
