KINGSTON EXPENDITURES
 As Provided In The Canadian Gov-
 ernment Estimates.
 The Government estimates for
 1916-17 show no increase for Port-
 mouth Penitentiary or the Royal
 Military College. The former gets
 \$210,000 and the latter \$160,000 for
 maintenance. The Kingston post-
 office is to be voted \$44,945, an in-
 crease of \$1,652 over last year.
 The estimates contain these re-
 notes: Royal Military College cov-
 ered drill hall, \$15,000; Kingston
 Ordnance stores building, \$10,000;
 Kingston harbor improvements,
 \$120,000; repairs to Royal Military
 College wharves, \$2,000.

Kingston Presbytery Meeting.

 bytery of Kingston will be held in
 Chalmers Church on Tuesday, 7th
 inst., at which the commissioners to
 the General Assembly in Winnipeg
 next June will be appointed. An in-

 subject, and report the result to the
 General Assembly.
