**RENFEW DEBENTURES**  
SOLD AT RATE OF 98.3.  
Issued in Connection With  
Grant of \$30,000 to Patri-  
otic Fund.  
Renfrew, March 6.—Debentures  
to the extent of \$30,000, authorized  
at the last meeting of Renfrew Coun-  
ty Council, have already been sold,  
the offer of a Toronto firm of brokers  
of \$29,490 having been accepted by  
a committee of the Council. This  
is at the rate of 98.30, which is  
slightly better than the Dominion  
war loan. The debentures, which  
bear five per cent. interest, and have  
ten years to run, are issued in con-  
nection with the county's grant to  
the Patriotic Fund.

**Death Of Tamworth Man.**  
Tamworth, March 6.—John C.  
Wells, harnessmaker of this village  
eighty-eight years of age, died on  
Friday afternoon of heart failure.

A Constantinople despatch states  
that the Turkish Chamber of Deputies  
has adopted a new general cus-  
toms tariff law, effective next Sep-  
tember 14th, and operative for a period of  
three years. The committee which  
framed the measure assumes that the  
war will be over at the end of that  
time, when a new tariff will be ne-  
cessary to conform to the changed  
economic conditions of the country.  
Isaac L. Huntington, aged seventy-  
seven, a veteran of the Civil War,  
in which he served as a member of  
the famous Tenth New York Heavy  
Artillery, died at Watertown, N. Y.,  
on Sunday.  
The Frankfurter Zeitung declares  
that the Entente Allies must have lost  
during the war thirty-three subma-  
rines—Great Britain, nineteen;  
France, eight; Italy, four, and Russia  
two.
