The inmates at the present time number only six, which is certainly most gratifying as to the present state of morality, etc., in the county. The jury suggested that it would be an advantage in many ways if the garb at the present time worn by the inmates was changed to one quieter in appearance. Many of the prisoners, and especially the younger men, are not criminals but plain drunks, and the garb such as now worn can hardly in any way be a help to them in regaining their self-respect more so when employed outside and subject to the gaze of every passer-by.
