THE BOARD OF WORKS TO ASK FOR \$25,500.
 For General Work on the Streets the Present Year.

The Board of Works needs \$25,500 for the general work required to be done on and in the streets this year. At yesterday afternoon's meeting, the City Engineer presented the estimates as to what was required. Of the above the amount \$2,000 is for snow cleaning; \$3,000 for cleaning the paved streets; \$3,000 for cleaning the other streets; \$6,000 for general repairs to the roads; \$1,500 for the grading of Thomas street.

Last year the Board spent \$22,308 for general work. It asked for more, but this civic department is one which asks and does not receive. It takes what it can get and is satisfied. The Engineer's estimates were sent on to the Finance Committee, which will do the necessary pruning in order to keep the tax rate to its present figure.

A letter was received from the Dominion Marine Department saying that it was considering the Board of Works' request to said engineers here to establish a new wharf head line in the harbor.

There was a lengthy discussion as to purchasing additional land for widening Thomas street, and for extending Patrick, but final action was withheld.

In attendance were Ald. Peters (chairman), Couper, O'Connor and White.

KINGSTONIAN SPEAKS ABOUT CAPT. GEORGE RICHARDSON.

"He Was a Man and a Friend to Everybody," Writes James Adam, in a Letter to His Mother—Was Present at His Funeral.

Mrs. M. Adam, 323 Brock street, has received the following letter from her son James Adam, serving in France:

I write you these few lines to let you know I am well, although a bit down-hearted at the loss of Capt. George Richardson. I guess you will know by now he has been killed. I could not believe it. I had to go around and have a look before I could believe it. I lifted the blanket and looked into his face and saw the one who nobly and bravely faced death for Britain's home and beauty. If ever a man deserved the Victoria Cross, he did. When dying, he knew he was about to go on his last long journey, but he did not shrink. He was proud to be the only one that night. The first thing he asked was: "Are Pte. and Corp. — back. I feel the loss terribly. No better friend was there to be had in all the Canadian. He was a man and a friend to everybody. But his day has come, and when death is out looking for its prey, it cares not who it claims. I was at his funeral. He died contentedly. His company feel bad about his death. And they swear the Germans will pay heavily the next time they get into the trenches. I will say again, there was no braver man in all the British army than George. I have only landed home from leave the other day, the ninth of Feb., the day the Captain was killed. All the boys are in the best of health."

LT. FRANK STRACHAN BACK IN KINGSTON.

Was Wounded in Shoulder—Now Attached to the 146th Battalion.

Lieut. Frank Strachan, son of Archibald Strachan, Collector of Customs, arrived back in the city on Wednesday afternoon, from England after having been at the front for some time and until invalided to England with a bullet in his right shoulder. Pte. Strachan was in the hardware business at Moose Jaw when the war broke out and immediately enlisted with the 11th Battalion of the First Contingent. He transferred in France to the 5th and again to the 1st Battalion. On June 5th last he was wounded in the right shoulder and sent back to England.

After being examined by three medical boards and a personal examination was made by Col. A. E. Ross, A. D. M. S., it was decided that the bullet should be allowed to remain as an operation just now would cause serious injury to the shoulder. He is able to use the elbow and wrist but for a while a least will not be able to raise his elbow level with the shoulder in a position that would let him use a rifle. He has been granted a commission and will be attached to the 146th Battalion to instruct that unit.
