News Of Troops in the City

The Minister of Militia last week stated that he only wanted the recruits secured in Canada to know elementary training before being sent across to England. This is the first announcement that he has made on the subject and it is a strong argument and official reason for the Militia Department to take over Barricade Camp for the soldiers of the 3rd Division this year.

To foist on the people, citizens and soldiers of Canada another white elephant as Valcartier proved to be in 1914 would be enough to justify an outcry from every place in Canada. There is absolutely no reason or excuse for using that colossal plain again. It looks as if a few big interests require a camp there to secure a bonus for their business that they would not otherwise get. From a military point of view the great increase in expense that the camp would entail is not at all justified.

Speaking of the local situation, Barricade Camp can accommodate 10,000 soldiers. There is an immense area for drilling and camping purposes and everything that Valcartier can offer may be had here without the great transportation expenses that the Quebec camp would cause. Do the recruiting figures from Quebec province justify the granting of such an immense camp to one district. They certainly do not.

Barricade is an ideal camp and unless an erratic decision is made by the Militia Department Kingston will have as usual another large military camp.

"Where we stand," is the title of the latest bulletin issued by Lieut.-Col. C. A. Low to further the recruiting interests of the 146th Battalion. The total strength is 1,152 men, enlisted are 733 men and wanted to complete, 420 men. The leading is: "Let us all get together boys and pull hard for more men. Our brass band is almost up to strength. The machine gun and signaling sections require fifty men. Our bugle band needs a few good buglers and drummers. Several of the platoons—sportsmen, students, and business men—are still under strength. We can take care of any man who wishes a place on any particular department of the organization. The men needed are here in Kingston waiting to have the proposition put direct. We have only a few weeks more to recruit. This means hustle everybody."

In view of the large number of Overseas Battalions being recruited, it is considered inadvisable, by Militia Headquarters, to continue to appoint supernumerary officers, until those supernumerary officers now attached to the different battalions in Canada, have been absorbed.

Under the present system the number of supernumerary officers, is continually increasing and these officers could do far more good and useful service if they were made provisional officers in new units. Moreover if they were reserved as supernumerary officers, and their unit went to the front, they would be left behind in England, thus denuding Canada of their services, and without any prospect of employment in England.

It is therefore intended that all supernumerary officers at present attached to units of the C.E.F. shall be absorbed into some overseas unit, before any further recommendations for attachment are dealt with.

On Tuesday next, as usual, the officers of the 14th Regiment will conduct a class of instruction for civilians who wish to receive free of charge, an elementary training in the art of being a soldier. Under the circumstances citizens should realize their duty and attend these classes and show that they are anxious to co-operate, even at personal sacrifice if necessary, and become trained so that should the necessity arise they would be of some value.

Sergt-Inst. Redding, 59th Battalion has been transferred for instruction to the School of Signalling here. He will be a valuable addition. There were 168 signallers in the class on Saturday, and it is the largest signalling class ever conducted in Canada.

THANKFUL TO BE LIVING

IN THESE DAYS WHEN PROHIBITION IS AT HAND.

Rev. E. D. Silcox, Toronto, Preaches On the Liquor Evil—A Thing Cannot Be Politically Right That Is Morally Wrong.

Rev. E. D. Silcox, Toronto, chairman of the Congregational Union of Canada preached in Brock Street Methodist Church on Sunday morning. Mr. Silcox is a member of the executive committee of the Dominion Alliance and also a member of Committee of One Hundred and it was in the interests of Prohibition, that he was in the city.

"In opening," he said that he was thankful to be living in these days. He could not say, however, as Mr. Clement did in presenting the petition to Premier Hearst last week that he felt like old Simon did: "Now Lord let me be put into the de-part in peace." Mr. Silcox wanted to live and see this thing through.

The speaker protested against our licensing a moral evil, making it a perfectly legal thing. "A thing can not be politically right that is morally wrong." The responsibility of doing wrong upon our own shoulders. As citizens we are engaged in the liquor business. The men who manufacture and sell liquor are no more responsible than we are. They are our agents and they pay us \$17,000,000 a year for the privilege. These millions that we put into the public treasury are nothing less than blood money. The business that the nation is thus carrying on results in the deaths of 6,000 of our citizens annually.

Speaking of the present prospects in temperance reform throughout the province, Mr. Silcox said that they were never brighter. The demonstration last week in Toronto when

HYDRO WILL DEVELOP PLANS

Power Concerns Purchased Do Not Cost Government to Maintain Them

Toronto March 13.—Hon. G. Howard Ferguson, supplementing his statement on the purchase of the Seymour interests in the Trent Valley, said that, although the deal was only signed up last night, the Province took control on March 1st.

"How will you pay the interest on the bonds?" Mr. Ferguson was asked.

There are over \$3,000,000 worth of bonds at 4 per cent, upon which to find money to pay nearly a third of a million of interest.

"Why these companies are all going concerns," said Mr. Ferguson. They are in good shape. We'll pay the interest out of earnings.

"When will you start and develop them to their capacity?"

"They are all well developed now," said Mr. Ferguson. "We will no doubt expand under the Hydro management as the business warrants."

"We have been so severely persecuted by the Hydro Commission in most unfair fashion," one of the officials of the company stated Saturday. "We were threatened that if we did not sell our rights the Government would destroy our investment."

According to the official, the power interests had done for eastern Ontario what Sir Adam Beck had done for the west.
