ATLANTIC SUGAR CLOSING BIG ORDER.
Secures Contract for 5,000 Tons of Refined Sugar From British Government.
D. Lorne McGibbon, president of the Atlantic Sugar Refineries, announced last night that an order for five thousand tons of refined sugar had been received from the British Government. The value of the new business is well over the half million dollar mark and means that with its domestic trade the St. John refinery is assured of capacity operating until the end of May. Since operations were inaugurated in 1915, the Atlantic plant has been operating between sixty and seventy per cent.

Mr. McGibbon said that full shipment of the contract would be made before June 1st. He expected that the new order would be the first of several, as British Government agents had satisfied themselves that the quality of Atlantic sugar was equal in every respect to the refined product of American sugar refineries.

The location of the company's plant on the Atlantic seaboard is advantageous for competing against American manufacturers. As the British Government is desirous of giving the preference to manufacturers within the Empire, Mr. McGibbon believed that the management's hopes for further business were well justified.

The acceptance of the order marks a new extension to Canadian trade, this being the first large export order received by any Canadian sugar refinery.

GOOD CAUSE THAT NEEDS HELP.
Shantymen's Christian Association Makes An Appeal.
Rev. Thomas Joplin, of the Shantymen's Christian Association, has returned to the city and will speak at Cooke's Church on Sunday evening. Mr. Joplin tells the Whig that the past season in the woods has been most successful. Each missionary did his "bit" for recruiting. As a result many men have been secured. The Association has helped to do special work among the boys at the front, and is also continuing its work among the camps and the lonely settlers. Much work will have to be given up unless funds come in. A leading citizen suggested to Mr. Joplin that 200 people here give a dollar or more each. Such splendid work should not suffer for lack of funds. Mr. Joplin will be in the city until Wednesday and can be found at 263 Brock street.
