

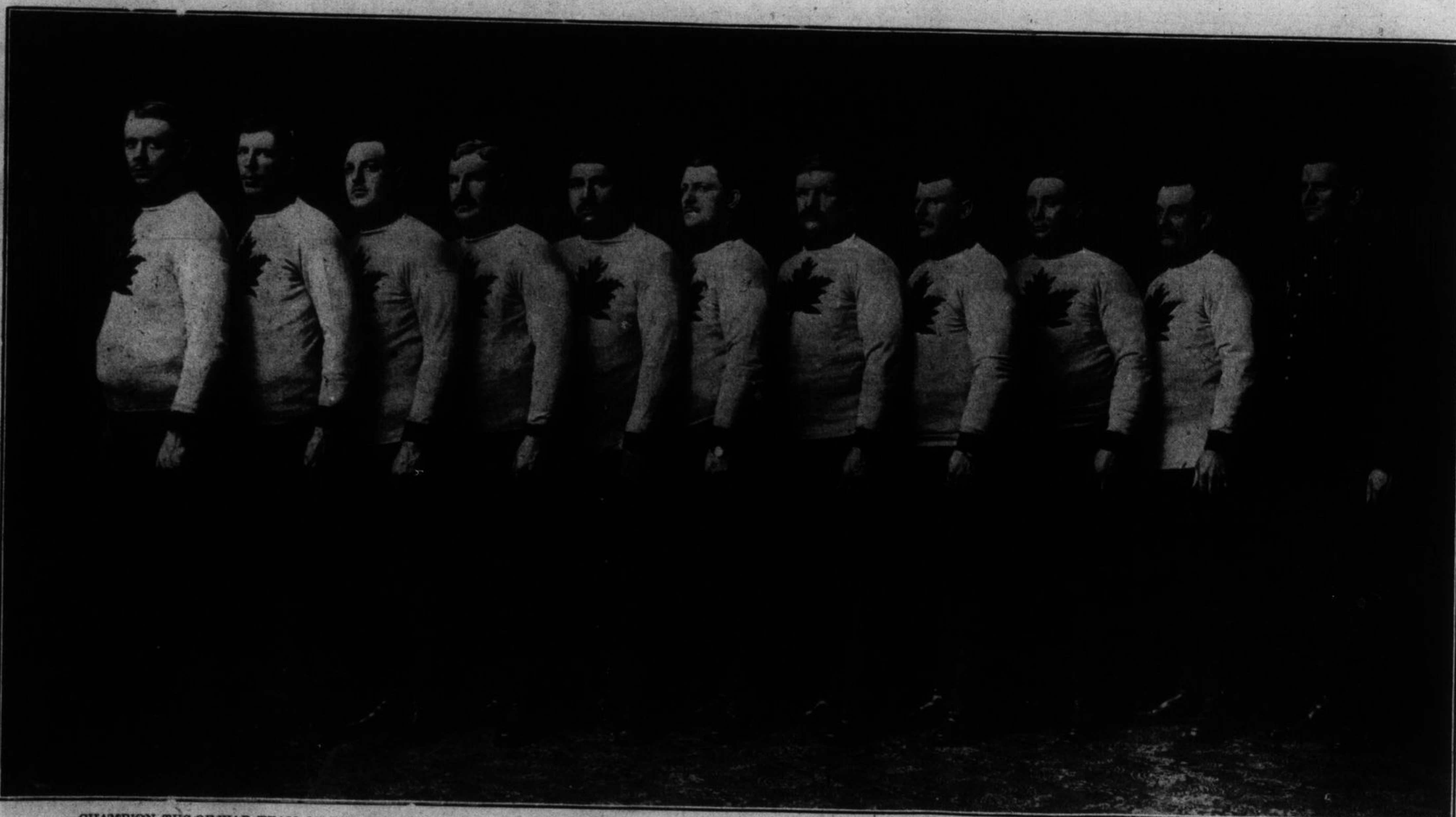

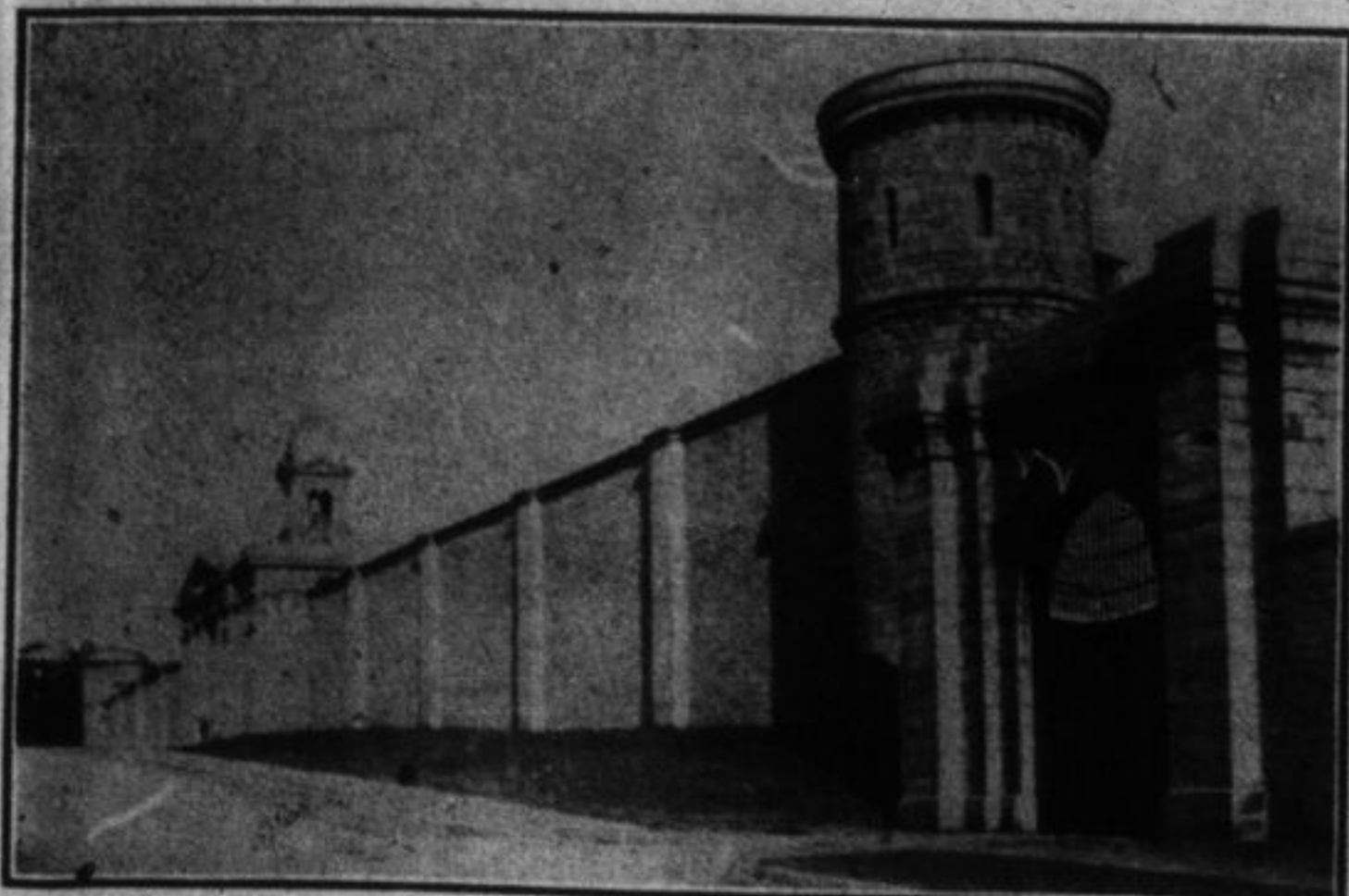

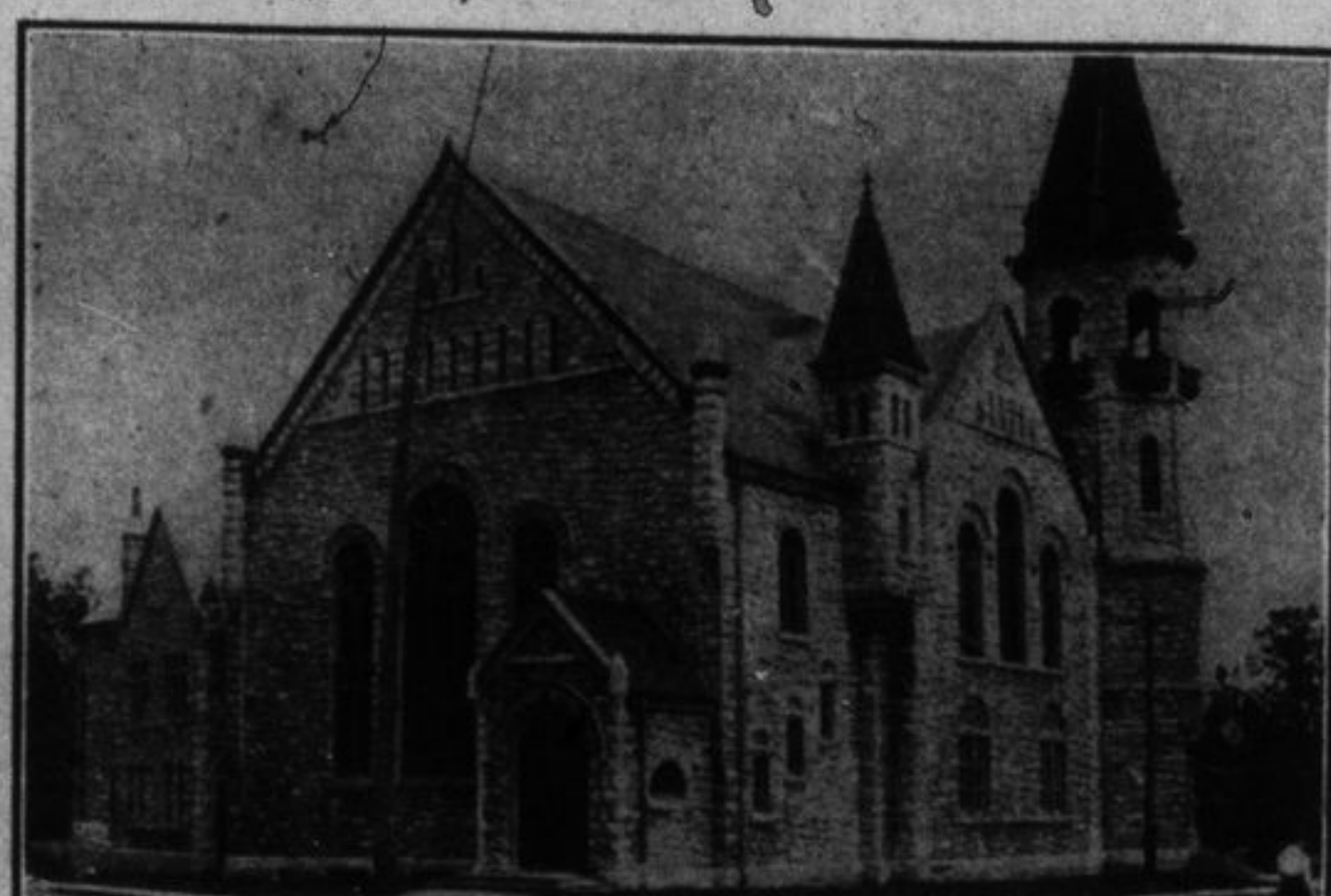
ar having was to scatter mines. Since the first of the March countless mines have been set adrift by the Germans in the North Sea. In the last week Zeppelins have been observed over the North Sea, evidently bent upon scouting operations. No attempt has been made by them to reach England. Their purpose, it is believed, here, was to ascertain movements of the British fleet. German seaplanes have reached the coast of England in scouting flights. Bomb-dropping has played no part in their activities. Apparently their flight was solely for purposes of reconnaissance. British officials admit that the signs of German unrest in all likelihood means the combined dash of the German air and sea fleets. "She has had eighteen months in which to try it out with us," declared an official to-day. "Perhaps in that time Germany has advanced, but we have too. Everything is fine and rosy so far as we are concerned." "The navy likes work," was the brief comment of another official. In those words he summed up the attitude of the entire British navy. None are more eager than they for the expected raid. A scrap is always to their liking. The Financial Times says negotiations are under way whereby the Imperial Bank will acquire the Northern Crown Bank of Winnipeg.



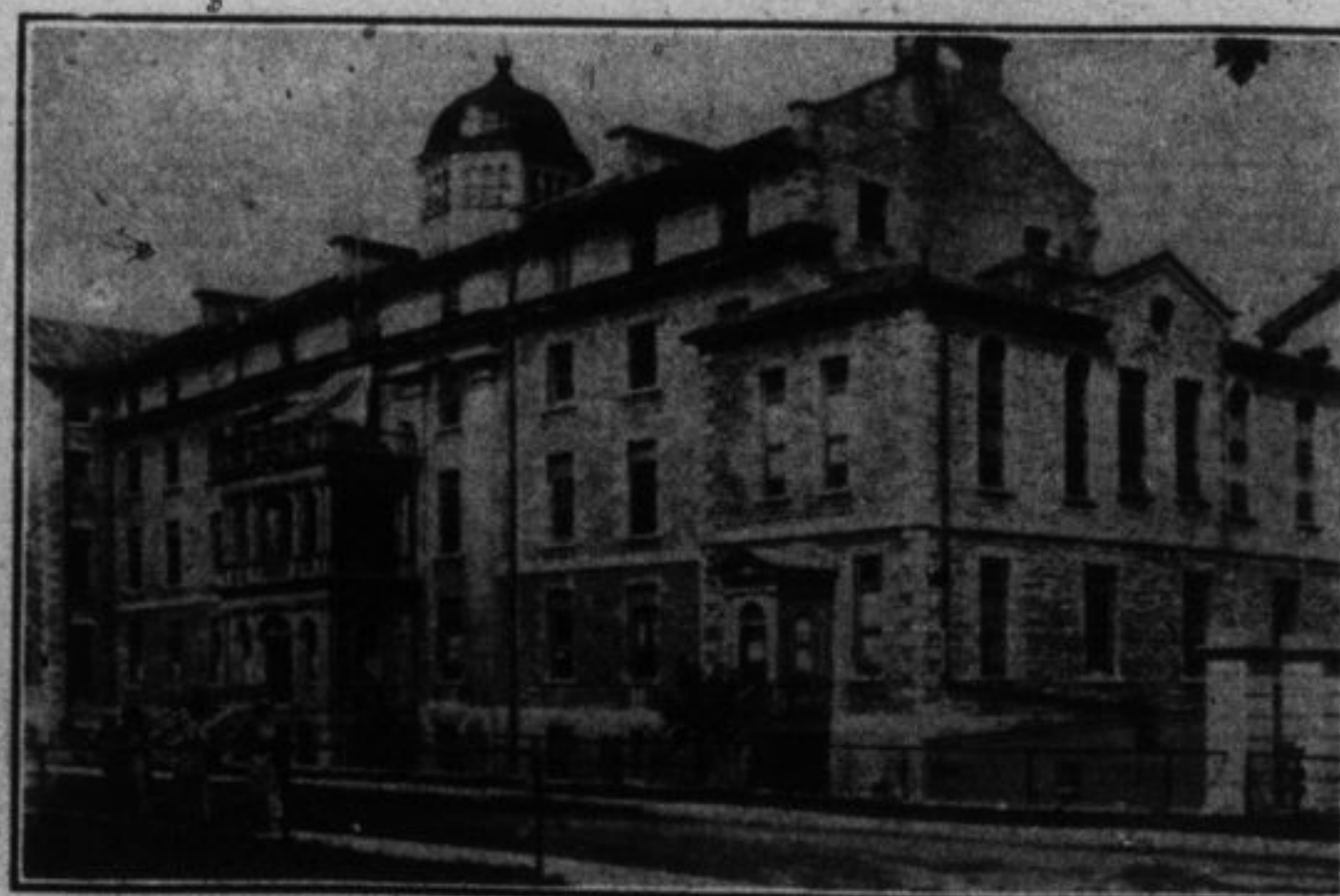
