BEING ORDERED TO ADVERTISE PRIZE FIGHT GATHERING.
Ensign Smith of the Salvation Army Declares It Is Not Right to Impose on Salvation Army Handmen of The 146th.
The officers of the 146th Battalion were severely criticised at the meeting in the Salvation Army Citadel on Sunday morning by Ensign Smith. His criticism was over the band of the battalion being ordered to parade up and down Princess street on Saturday night for the purpose of advertising the assault-at-arms in the City Hall. As the band of the 146th has some twenty-four Salvationists in it, Ensign Smith stated that it was not right for the officers to order these men to parade the streets advertising a "fight."
Ensign Smith states that for many years these same men have been urging others to lead a better life, and yet they are now seen on the streets urging men to go to the City Hall and witness an assault-at-arms and also hear the announcements concerning the prize fight between Willard and Moran.
An officer who has seen service with a British regiment, when speaking to the Whig, stated that it was contrary to British regulations for a military unit to carry any advertising banners through the streets. The only colors which can be carried are the regimental colors.

BAND OF YOUTHFUL BURGLARS HAVE BEEN ROUNDED UP.

Amounts Reaching to Several Hundred Dollars Taken From Different Places—Seventeen Stores Believed To Have Been Robbed.
A band of boy burglars have been rounded up in Kingston. It is believed that in the past few months money amounting to several hundred dollars has been taken by five lads from seventeen stores.
L. W. Murphy, grocer, corner of Princess and King streets, was one of the heaviest losers. He has been robbed of over \$200, and in addition, checks totalling about \$75 were also taken from his store.
The lads have been having a high old time, eating at restaurants, attending five-cent shows, buying candy galore, giving their friends money and treating them in royal fashion.
The round-up of the youngsters was brought about on Saturday afternoon. The lads implicated are about twelve years of age. About 4:30 o'clock, during the business rush hours in Murphy's store, one of the lads went into the shop, and while no person was in the office, tapped the till for \$115 and a cheque for \$20. He was caught red-handed by one of the clerks, while he was making his way out of the store. The clerk noticed the greenbacks sticking out of the boy's pockets.
A call was sent to the police station, and the lad was placed under arrest by Constable McCarey, and taken to the "lock-up" provided for juveniles. Constables Bateson and Sargeant got busy, and as a result of their efforts, four other lads implicated in the thefts were rounded up, two of them being held and the others being summoned as witnesses.
The lad who was arrested was questioned, and he admitted taking some hours in Murphy's store, one of his companions, who was also implicated, some of his companions. The boys were arraigned in the Juvenile Court on Monday morning, and two hours were taken up in the hearing of the cases. One lad was sentenced to an indefinite term in the Industrial School, and the case of another was adjourned for a day. In the case of three others an order was issued which will compel them to report to Inspector W. H. Wylie, of the Children's Aid Society, every week.
