**INFLUENCE DEGRADING MADE BRUTAL ATTACK**

**REV. D. LAING OBJECTS TO ASSAULT-AT-ARMS.**

Sides With Ensign Smith—Declares City Hall Event Recently Was Close To a Prize Fight.  
Rev. Douglas Laing's subject in the First Baptist Church on Sunday evening was, "Our Country Awakening to Consider Needed Moral Reforms." His text was "Righteousness exalteth a nation; but sin is a reproach to any people."  
He said that he had heard of preachers who were said to select their text from the Bible and preach from the newspapers. He feared he might have to plead guilty to this accusation this afternoon, but felt that we must go to the Word of God for our great foundation principles, when speaking on things having a moral aspect. Our newspapers, however keep us in touch with all the important activities of our nation, and of the world.  
Every reader of the daily press must have been interested to note how much alive our people, and our public men are to secure needed moral reforms. He referred to "The Children's Protective Act," it had been brought into being over twenty years ago, but only of late years had most municipalities become alive to its importance. Many municipalities are now liberally supporting its important work.  
Reforms are sought in the management of our penal institutions. It is desired to introduce the reformatory influence to a much larger extent than at present prevails. It has been felt "Righteousness" is not being done to the large class of mental defectives found in our province. There is no adequate provision made to properly care for them, in not providing for them, it is felt that our province is sinning against them.  
The pastor had strong words to say against what he said is euphemistically called "An Assault-at-Arms"—a fine name in which to clothe an ugly thing. It is reported that it is akin to the degrading pugilistic fight, Ensign Smith rightly raised objection to the Bandmen of the 146th Battalion being ordered to carry a placard advertising a "fight." He calls this assault-at-arms by its right name.

**ON YOUNG MAN WHO FAILED TO PAY FOR MEAL**

Toronto Soldier Was Fined \$10 And Costs in the Police Court Monday Morning—Man Arrested For Drunkenness Claimed He Was Doped.
