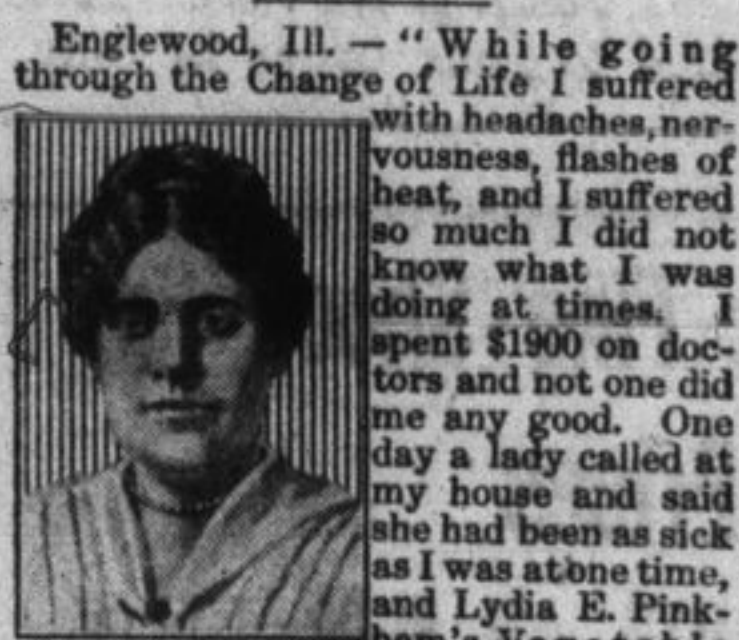

News Of Troops in the City

There were 1,586 men recruited for units in Military District No. 3 in the last two weeks. There were 234 men secured for Kingston units. This number is made up as follows: 146th Battalion, 98 recruits; 59th Battery (Queen's), 31 recruits; 51st, 48 recruits; 52nd, 8 recruits; 53rd, 23 recruits; R. C. H. A., "C" Battery, 109 recruits.

The 154th Battalion made the best record of battalions for the two weeks and increased its number by 228. The units increased their strength as follows: 77th by 21; 80th by 24; 93rd by 66; 109th by 108; 130th by 171; 136th by 101; 139th by 93; 146th by 98; 154th by 228; 115th by 146; 156th by 160; 20th by 34; C. E. T. D., by 178, and 20 unattached recruits at Ottawa.

There are 12,300 N. C. O.'s and men in Military District No. 3. This number is made up with 1,586 recruits, 281 appointed officers, 228 attached officers with a total on the roll of 12,919.

The strength of the Kingston artillery units is as follows: 50th Battery—Officers 9; men 142. 51st Battery—Officers 15; men, 183. 52nd Battery—Officers 9; men, 141. 53rd Battery—Officers 13; men, 253. "C" R. C. H. A.—Officers 9; men, 229.

This District has sent over in the last two weeks 1,237 officers, N.C.O.'s and men.

The 146th Battalion has a strength of 840 men, 31 appointed officers and 13 attached officers. The different stations have the following men: Arden 48; Sharbot Lake, 58; Flinton, 60; Tamworth, 61; Napanee, 58; Sydenham, 35; Parham, 13; Mountain Grove, 19; Fermoy, 21; Battersea, 15; Harrowsmith, 14; and Kingston 320 under Lieut.-Col. C. A. Low. The first of a series of entertain-

ments that Lieut.-Col. C. A. Low plans for the men of the 146th Battalion was given in the City Hall on Saturday evening. For their entertainment he had Will White and Josh Brazil two of the best comedians in Toronto to keep the men in roars of laughter. Q. M. S. Addison, Piper Fraser, Sergt. chaplain and Sergt. Prichard also materially assisted in putting on a splendid programme.

Capt. W. F. Jarvis, 42nd Regiment Camp Guard at Petawawa was in the city on Saturday. Major G. H. Gillespie left on Monday for Ottawa to transfer the stores of No. 5 C. A. S. C., from Capt. Gillies to Lieut. Green. The major returned from Lakefield on Saturday.

Capt. R. R. Barker, A.M.C., has been detailed as medical officer with the 224th Forestry Battalion at Ottawa.

The first battalion church parade of the 146th was held in the Armouries on Sunday afternoon, when Capt. G. L. Campbell, chaplain, preached from the text, Ephesians IV, 4: "There is one Body and one Spirit even as ye are called in one hope of your calling." He dealt with efficiency and implored the men to make themselves as efficient as possible for the great fight.

Lieut. Bush brought in five men from Tamworth for the 146th Battalion on Saturday.

Lieut. Smith, 146th Battalion, issued the call for recruits for that unit in Sydenham Street Methodist Church on Sunday evening. Mr. Smith stated that it was the wish of the officer commanding and the officers that the battalion go into camp at Barriefield in about five weeks' time up to full strength. At the present time there were 863 men wearing the uniform; almost three hundred more men have to be secured. He paid a compliment to the men who formed the band of the battalion. His appeal was probably the best heard in Sydenham Street Church since the battalion first started to recruit.

The 77th and 80th Battalions at Ottawa and Belleville respectively have received their "marching orders" to get ready for overseas immediately. The 80th Battalion was organized at Barriefield camp, and has one of the most efficient staffs of officers of any overseas battalion. The men are of a very high standard, and well trained. Reports from Ottawa indicate that the 77th has also done splendidly.

Capt. Huntley Gordon, son of Principal Gordon, has been appointed to command No. 4 Divisional Ammunition Park. The Park is bigger than a battery, and one of the items of the establishment is ninety-two motor lorries. The recommendation for the appointment was made in view of the fact that Capt. Gordon has seen twelve months' service at the front with the motor-transport.

The officers who will be on Capt. Gordon's staff will be Lieut. M. L. Wayne, Ottawa; Lieut. Hugh J. Ryan, Kingston; Lieut. L. D. Carling, Ottawa, and Lieut. E. M. Soper, Ottawa.

For some reason the park was not allotted to Kingston, but will be trained in Toronto. Major J. Hamilton, A. D. of S. and T., however, hopes to make it a Military District No. 3 unit by giving Capt. Gordon every assistance in recruiting men for the park in this division.

The establishment of the park is 433 men, with an artillery detail of one officer and seventy-eight men. There are five working sections, the largest of these being the headquarters which includes a motor workshop and the necessary repair men. A working section has forty-eight artificers, four foremen, eight blacksmiths, eight wheelers (carpenters), four electricians, twenty-four fitters and turners, with the remainder motor car drivers. There will be five motor cars, nine motor cycles and ninety-two motor lorries. Major Hamilton has already the names of over 200 men who wish to join the park.

Capt. W. E. Steacy, "C" Battery, R. C. H. A., is in Toronto on recruiting.

After the service in Sydenham Street Methodist Church on Sunday evening a social half hour was spent. Miss Gertrude Laidley sang a solo, while Abraham Shaw gave the words of welcome. A similar service was held in Queen Street Methodist Church. It was well attended and was very enjoyable.
