

WARNING IS GIVEN THE EASTWELL FAMIL! TO PEOPLE WHO FAIL TO MAKE CONTRIBUTE ALL THEIR MEN TO THE CAUSE.

Of Births Marriages and Deaths- Their Son George, Not Yet Of Age, The Last To Enlist With the 146th Battalion

Mr. and Mrs. George Eastwell, who lives at No. 12 Charles street, certainly deserve the honor of being one of the most patriotic families in Kingston. In the next house, which is around the corner and at 212 Rideau street, lives their two daughters, one the wife of Sergt. Akerley, R.C.H.A., and one the widow of Bugler, Frederick Carter, who was killed in action on March 18th last while carrying machine gun ammunition for the 21st Battalion, Mr. and Mrs. Eastwell's son, George, who lives with his parents, is also a soldier. Unable to go overseas he has been with the 14th Regiment Guard and is a capable soldier.

When the war broke out Sergt. Akerley, being with the permanent force, went overseas with the R.C.H. A. Illness caused his return to Canada but determined to have one representative of the family on the firing line prompted the late bugler Carter to enlist in the 21st. He made the supreme sacrifice for his King and country but this did not satisfy Mr. and Mrs. Eastwell. Their son George is still unable to join the Canadian. Expeditionary Force, but though near the age limit he has enisted in the 146th Battalion. In conversation with Lieut.-Col. C. A. Low, he said that his military experience was nil, but he intended to work hard and learn. The 146th Battalion has acquired one soldier more who has doned the khaki with the one object of killing Germans. Pte. Eastwell-has been granted ten days leave of absence and will continue his duties as assistant engineer of the Dominion Textile Company, until a substitute can be secured.
