**NAPANEE IS VISITED**

BY A DETACHMENT OF THE 146TH BATTALION

Lieut.-Col. Low and Capt. J. T. Sutherland Appealed For Recruits—Mrs. T. G. Carscallen Died Tuesday Afternoon.

Napanee, April 5.—Napanee was invaded by a detachment from the 146th Battalion, with the band coming on the G. T. R. train arriving here at 2.33 o'clock yesterday afternoon. They were in charge of Lieut.-Col. C. A. Low, O. C. and Capt. J. T. Sutherland. The Napanee Platoon, under Lieut. J. J. Graham, and the Boy Scouts under Assistant Scoutmaster A. Day, were lined up on the platform to meet them. They paraded the streets, giving the citizens an opportunity to listen to and admire the splendid band which Lieut. Col. Low has gathered together. The assault-at-arms and concert given in the Town Hall was well attended. Selections were given by Sergt. W. McFedridge, Q. M. Sergt. Hart; vocal selections by Bert Weiss; boxing bouts by McKibbin and Stockbridge, and Blakey and Hartley, Parkes and Kennedy, and a wrestling bout between Ellerbeck of Glenburnie and Mackibbie of Montreal.

Capt. Sutherland appealed for thirty more men from Napanee to complete the 146th Battalion. Col. Low also gave a recruiting speech, appealing to the young men to do their duty and come forward.

Private Foote a returned member of the Princess Patricia's Light Infantry who mounted the platform at the request of Captain Sutherland was given a rousing reception. Cheers after cheer greeted this battle-scarred hero as he told the story of how the Canadians saved the day at Ypres.

Mrs. Carscallen wife of T. G. Carscallen, member of parliament for Lennox, died yesterday afternoon. She had been ailing for about four years but was fatally stricken a few days ago.

Joshua Pendell, an employee of Messrs. Boyle & Son, and a member of the Napanee Fire Brigade, is sick, only ill, suffering from spinal meningitis and no hope is given for his recovery.
