Moved, Howes-Peters, that the clerk reply to Macmurchy and Spence, regarding the diverting of road at lot 20, con. 4 and 5, and lot 25, con. 1, 7 and 8, saying that by-law could be passed at meeting of council to be held at Parham, Friday, May 26th, 1916, if the necessary advertising and notices were done in proper time, and that no action be taken on application to have side line between lots 10 and 11, con. 9, and road allowance between con. 8 and 9, closed. Carried. Moved, Jeffrey-Howes, that the revise and clerk be a committee to examine time books, etc., and issue orders to road superintendents. Carried. Mr. Wylie gave an address on the work, etc., of the Children's Aid Society which was very interesting. Accounts passed: W. W. Kar, collector, \$50.50; N. Bush, car, \$6; W. J. Geddes, M.D., medical attendance to Mrs. N. Bush, \$6. Council adjourned to May 26th, 1916, to meet at Parham.

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
