PUT WOMAN OUT DOORS KILLED IN ACTION
AND TOOK POSSESSION OF THE HOME HERSELF
Woman Made Things Lively While Under the Influence of Liquor — Two Women Arrested On Saturday Night For Drunkenness.
Two women were occupants of the police cells on Saturday night. One was Annie Williams, and the other, Ida Thromber, and the charge against the two was that of drunkenness.
When people are under the influence of liquor, they do strange things. It is said of Annie Williams that while in her cups she ran into a neighbor's house, chased a woman out on to the street, and then took possession of the household. Constables Jenkins and Patterson removed her from the house to the police station, and then the rightful owner went back to her home in peace and quietness. The accused was before the Magistrate just a few days ago, and on that occasion was fined. This time it cost her a fine of \$2 plus the costs of the court, making a total of \$3.50.
Ida Thromber was fined \$2 and costs, or a total of \$4.50. It costs money to fall into the arms of the law, sometimes. Constables Patterson and Naylor arrested the accused.
Christopher Ruttle was charged by his wife, with non support, but it was announced that the charge had been withdrawn. The case has been pending for a week.
Henry Pollex, the German who went insane from strong drink, was further remanded for a week. Henry is just as crazy as he was when he came before the Magistrate, a few days ago, and if his condition does not improve, he may have to go to an institution, for treatment. He imagines that men are after him all the time in order to shoot him.
Peter Collins tarried too long over John Collins, and fell by the wayside. Constables Jenkins and McCarey picked him up and after the Magistrate looked him over, there was a fine of \$2 and costs against him.

MARINE INTELLIGENCE.
The Tug Ray Stanton Was Out on Sunday.
The tug Ray Stanton is the first boat to open navigation in Kingston harbor, having pulled out on Sunday. The opening is twenty days later than last spring. Last spring the Ray Stanton broke the ice on March 22nd, and went to Belleville on March 25th, which entitled Capt. Grant Pyke to a new hat from both Kingston and Belleville. He expects to be able to clear for Cape Vincent on Wednesday, providing that some of the very heavy ice leaves the channel.
The wind on Sunday had a telling effect on the ice. In some places it had worn away very much, and all that was needed was a heavy wind to get it going.
It is expected that the steamer Wolfe Islander will make an attempt to reach the city this afternoon or Tuesday morning providing the crew are able to get the steamer ready for service. The men did not expect the channel to break up so soon, and for that reason the engine is not quite ready. The ice on the Wolfe Island shore is very heavy.
The fleet of the Montreal Transportation Company will start out about April 20th or 25th.
All's well with the sloop Kitty Wells. The veteran mariner, Capt. Mahoney, has his boat all in readiness for the opening of navigation.
Marine men state that this will be one of the busiest seasons in many years. There will be some difficulty, it is expected, and that will be in securing the number of men required.

TALKED TO WOMEN.
They Should Do Good Work in the Struggle.
On Sunday afternoon the St. Mary's Cathedral branch of the Kingston Women's Emergency Corps held a meeting in the City Hall. Mrs. G. Hunter Ogilvie presided. Over 100 ladies were present.
Lieut.-Col. G. Roy, appealed to women to join the corps citing the official reports of what had happened to the women of Belgium and Serbia as examples of what would happen should Canada be invaded. He did not think that the women are altogether to blame for the slacking up of recruiting but his appeal was that if they would not help they should not hold back the men who were thinking of enlisting.
R. B. Bennett, M.P., Calgary, pointed out the duty that had been accorded to Canadians to do what they could to assist in this great struggle. W. F. Nickle, M.P., also spoke a few words on the need of co-operation. Capt. W. E. Steacy said only two per cent of Kingston's population had enlisted. At the close the captain took the names of ladies who would join the corps.

PACKING THE PARCELS.
On Tuesday week the American Consul will send off the next consignment of goods for the Kingston men who are prisoners-of-war in Germany. Donations are already coming in, and he hopes that fully 150 parcels will be made up. The packing will take place on Monday next, and Mr. Johnson extends an invitation to any person interested to come and see the packages being prepared for their long trip.

A DISTINCTIVE BADGE.
Will Be Provided For the Queen's O. T. C.
Queen's C. O. T. C. will soon have a distinctive badge. Lieut.-Col. Cunningham, commandant of the organization, has secured the funds to proceed with its casting and stamping. Prof. J. M. Lanois of the Royal Military College is the designer. The coat of arms of Queen's is used as the field with the cross quartering the shield, but the rose, shamrock, etc., are replaced by the letters C. O. T. C. The imperial crown forms the crest; crossed rifles are the supports. The motto will be two of the words in the university's battle cry. Other badges, coats of arms or pins designed by Prof. Lanois are: Frontenac Club crest, Nickle gold medal for nurses, a badge for the 14th which has not been struck yet, several class pins and crest for the K. G. H.

No Action Taken.
The secretary of the Kingston Teachers' Association wrote to twenty different cities and towns in Ontario, and asked if the School Boards had suspended the salary schedule or taken steps to reduce the salaries. The reply from seventeen was "no." In two places they were talking of reducing all civic salaries, and in another place a movement to do so had failed.
