Mr. Sears celebrated his seventy-seventh birthday last September and was born in New York City, where for some years he had been interested in the publishng and brokerage business. Twenty-five years ago he removed to Toronto and was a governor of the Toronto Conservatory of Music and always a strong supporter of the Sym-phony Orchestra. 
