ALLISON NOT PRESENT

THE MUNITIONS KING HAS NOT REACHED OTTAWA

Opinion at the Capital is That John Wesley Allison Duped Hughes and Deceived Borden. Ottawa, April 14.—One man is not here. There is no news in New York from Honorary Col. J. Wesley Allison. He is still "somewhere down south." He may mean what he said in his telegram to the Davidson Commission. He may intend to go to Ottawa and face the music. But most of the men waiting here for Sir Sam are willing to wager that he'll take some cooing. Among the munition contractors there seems to be remarkable fidelity to the Minister of Militia. But more remarkable is the amazing freedom and frankness with which these men—most of them foreigners—discuss the affairs of the sanctum sanctorum of Canadian politics. Cabinet meetings are not happenings of dignified mystery to them. They tell without batting an eyelash how the members of the Canadian Government "took sides" on this or that question, giving names, too. Least majestic is their title role. They talk intimately of "Jack" Reid, "Tom" White, "Bob" Rogers and "Young" McEwen. They profess to know who was "kissing Sam" from within and who was loyal to him.

Opinions of Allison. With seeming heavy unanimity Allison stands condemned. It is alleged that "he duped Hughes and deceived Borden," as one of them put it. "What I think of Allison would not stand publication," was the statement of another. The Morrissey man is said to have played the game shrewdly and well. "When Borden and Hughes"—Knights do not get titles from these men—"returned together from England," said one, "the first man to greet them at the pier and take charge of them was Allison. He was continually playing his own game."

It is difficult to piece together a story told in sudden, unexpected jerks of frankness, and accompanied by adjurations not to "quote me." It looks, however, as though Lignanti himself drew the famous contract road to bankruptcy, and that advance payments were not unusual. No explanation is yet forthcoming as to premature division of spoils, and no sweeping defence has been tendered as to why such contracts and advances were not first offered to Canadian manufacturers.

THE FRENCH POSSESS

THE ASCENDANCY IN THE AIR OVER GERMANS.

Exploits of Aviators Are Daily Demonstration of Superiority—Adjutant Navarre Engaged Five German Aeroplanes Single-handed. Paris, April 14.—As the French infantry and artillery are making every effort to block the efforts of the Germans to get toward Verdun, their comrades in the air are no less busy. They have now established a complete ascendancy in that element, and every day sees fresh exploits. Last week Adjutant Navarre, who has accounted for seven German aeroplanes, was in the air twenty-four hours in three days. He seems to sit in his machine as a good horseman sits on his horse. He handles his machine gun in such a way that he load it he has to let go the levers of the aircraft. When it was pointed out to him that this was dangerous, he answered: "Possibly, but it is more convenient."

A few days ago Navarre fought five Fokkers single-handed. "They were fairly far off," he said, "to the right and left, and before and behind. I made sure that my baby (a fast aeroplane) was well in hand, and I did some tricks to amuse them. Suddenly, as if at a given signal, all five bore down on me I waited for them. Then I made three little loops and came up behind two Fokkers. Naturally I let drive at them. The others dared not try to snipe me for fear of hitting their own pals. It was extremely funny."

One of the most extraordinary feats was performed by a beginner who is not yet twenty-one. "I was having a little argument with two passengers in a Fokker some thirteen hundred feet up," said he, smiling. "A broadside from their machine gun put mine out of business. There was nothing for me to do but to make myself scarce, but I was so angry I made a swoop at them, and my propeller caught the tail of their machine, taking off the best part of it."

The blow put my engine out of gear, and I dropped 300 feet. I thought I was going to be shot out of my machine, but I managed to right her in time, and had the satisfaction of seeing my two Germans finish the race to death alone."

Claims Harry Thaw As Husband. St. Louis, April 14.—Another wife of Harry Thaw, who shot Stanford White, came forward to-day. She brought suit for divorce against him, her name appearing in the legal papers as Mrs. Christina Thaw. She keeps a candy store in St. Louis.

In the petition filed by her lawyer, Vern G. Lacey, she asks for maintenance and for the custody of her child, named Lady Gwendolin Clemmons, for she avers that Thaw married her in Buffalo, N.Y., on October 6th, 1902, under the name of Harry Kendall Thaw Clemmons. A month after the baby was born she says, Thaw took the child away from her and she has not seen it since.

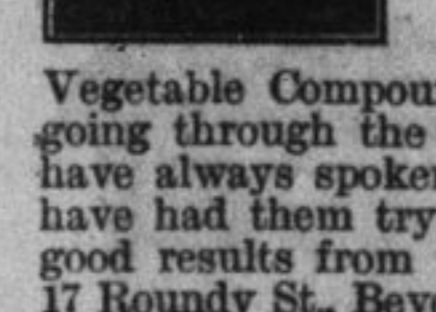

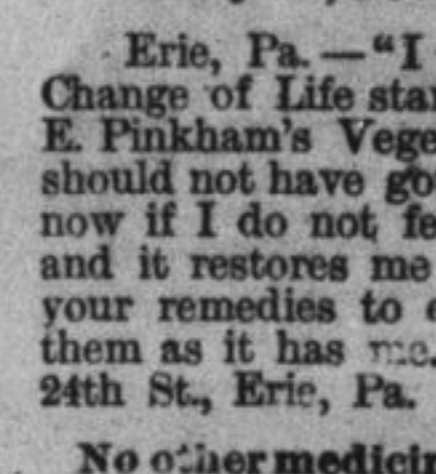
