A MAN OF THE WOODS

ARRESTED NEAR DENBIGH FOR STEALING A SHEEP.

And Brought To Napanee Jail—Cheese Sold On the Napanee Board For 17 1/2 Cents.

 Napanee, April 22.—County Constable Thomas Dixon and Game Warden, William Briscoe, arrived here Thursday with Bert Lambert, from the township of Lindock, Kenner County. The prisoner who is charged with stealing a sheep from a settler by the name of John Edwards, township of Denbigh, is a veritable man of the woods. He is about forty years of age, and lives by himself in a shack in the mountains near Denbigh. In fact the accused is credited with having four shacks in different parts of the country, and only comes out to a settlement two of three times a year to dispose of his furs and hides, and to obtain a few necessities and ammunition. He is credited with being a crack shot rarely missing anything he aims at so much so, that the constable who was to have made the arrest, declined to go near him, and Constable Dixon, of Renfrew, was asked to effect his arrest, which he did and brought him under a strong guard to Napanee, where he appeared yesterday, before Magistrate Rankin, charged with the theft of a sheep and was committed for trial.

The first regular meeting of the Napanee Cheese Board was held Thursday in the town hall, about 22 cheeses were offered and sold at 17 1/2 cents.

The funeral of the late Samuel Hamby, who died, after an illness of about two weeks, took place from his residence on East street yesterday afternoon. Deceased was eighty-six years of age, and leaves on son John, and two daughters. Previous to coming to Napanee some years ago, he was a successful farmer at Gretna.
