



The Commission decided to ask the City Council to submit to the vote of the people the Campbell power by-It does not want to do any dickering with the Hydro-Electric Commission on the matter, preferring that the people should give their sanction to a measure that will give the city an additional supply of power from the Kingston Mills water falls. It is desirous that the local plant get this auxiliary supply soon, and the manager was instructed to arrange for the purchase of the necessary transforming machinery that the power could be secured at the earliest possible date after the people have passed upon the by-law. The submitting of the by-law is, regarded as a mere formality, for the people will vote for a measure that is going to be of immense benefit to the electrical plant.
