CABARET BY "C" BATTERY.
A Big Event in the City Hall Next Wednesday Evening.
The announcement that "C" Battery, R.C.H.A., which has made Kingston the Woolwich of Canada is to put on a real "cabaret" in the city hall on Wednesday brought a thrill of delight to every person in Kingston who takes pleasure in listening to good music, solos and songs of every kind. This is the first of its kind that has ever been put on by the battery since the war broke out, in spite of the fact that over 1,300 men have already been trained and left this depot for the front.

ARCHDEACON CAREY INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

DIED AT HIS HOME ON THURSDAY AFTERNOON

Served the Anglican Church in Ontario Diocese For Forty-eight Years—Born in County Cork, Ireland.

Another of Kingston's most respected citizens passed away Thursday afternoon in the person of the venerable Archdeacon William Balfour Carey, M.A., D.C.L., at his home, 230 Brock street. For the last six months, the late archdeacon had been ill with heart trouble and death came very quietly at the end of a man, who had been zealous in the pursuit of all good things.

Archdeacon Carey was born at Castle Townsend, County Cork, Ireland, about seventy-five years ago. The family settled in Napanee where he received his early education. He was very clever as a young man and received his B.A. and M.A. degrees in the late fifties from Trinity College. Early in life he felt the call of the church and in 1853 he was ordained as a deacon. In the following year he was made a priest and from 1868 to 1879 he acted in capacity of curate at Lancaster. For three years thereafter he was a missionary at March. During the two years from 1873 to 1875 he acted as rector of Matilda and Ironquols, and from 1875 to 1907 he was rector of St. Paul's, Kingston, retaining the title on retiring.

In 1895 he was made rural dean of Frontenac, and in 1900 he was appointed Archdeacon of Quinte, changing his title to Archdeacon of Kingston in 1901, with jurisdiction over the eastern portion of the diocese, and in 1913 he became Archdeacon of Ontario with jurisdiction in the western part of the diocese.

Archdeacon Carey took a course in the Royal Military School at Kingston, completing it in 1864. He served with the volunteers at Ridgewood.

The late archdeacon's father, Francis Carey, a Royal Navy surgeon, practised for many years in Napanee.

By the Archdeacon's death a notable figure is removed from the Diocese of Ontario and the Church in Canada. Bishop Bidwell said to the Whig: "He was a man of vigor and personality, he remarked, with at times a somewhat bluff manner, but no man ever possessed a kinder heart, or was more ready to help those who were in trouble of any kind. He had a most intimate knowledge of the history of the diocese, and devoted time and labour to the interests of the various departments of diocesan work, in which his keen business faculty was most valuable. He was a most entertaining companion, possessing a keen sense of humour, and a wide experience of human nature. His services, which were ungrudgingly given, will be much missed in diocesan organizations, and a very large circle of friends will lament the loss of one whose kindly character made him a welcomed friend. The late Archdeacon was a strong and devoted churchman, and with his passing a striking figure of what may be called "the old guard" of the Church of Ontario, to whom so much is owed by the present generation, is removed from the scene, where, however, his memory will long remain green.

The late Archdeacon Carey is survived by his wife and one son Travers Carey at home.
The funeral of the deceased is to be held at St. George's Cathedral on Saturday afternoon. Service will be conducted at two o'clock by the Bishop of Kingston, after which the remains will be placed aboard the three o'clock G.T.R. train for Napanee where interment will be made.
