RELIEF IS NEEDED BY THE RAILWAYS.

Sir Thomas White Explains Reasons for Aiding C. N. R. and G. T. P.

Ottawa, May 9.—In the Commons this afternoon Sir Thomas White, Minister of Finance, made an explanation of the reasons which induced the Government to put in the estimates the sum of \$23,000,000 for the Grand Trunk Pacific and the Canadian Northern Railways.

These directors will be capable railway men whose names would be announced shortly.

The affairs of the two railway companies, which it is proposed to aid," said the Minister, "have given the Government considerable worry in the past few months."

It had been made clear by the statements tabled in the House, "that relief is absolutely necessary if the railways are to remain as solvent going concerns."
